Devon does its bit for Prostate Cancer Awareness Month



March is Prostate Cancer Awareness Month, a campaign by Prostate Cancer UK to increase awareness of this killer disease and raise funds to support sufferers and their families.

Doing his bit to raise the campaign's profile is Sky Sports presenter Jeff Stelling who is repeating his March for Men - a marathon trek of almost 400 miles, starting at Exeter City's St James Park on 2 June and visiting 40 football clubs in 15 days.

Last year Jeff, accompanied by more than 400 sporting celebs, fans and fundraisers, completed the first March For Men and raised £420,000 along the way. This year his fundraising goal is £500,000 to help to fight a disease killing one man every hour in the UK.

Decision by Governing Body on Your Future Care consultation

On Thursday 2 March 2017, the NHS Northern, Eastern and Western Devon Clinical Commissioning Group's (NHS NEW Devon CCG) Governing Body met to discuss the Your Future Care consultation and consider the recommendations which have come out of that. You can find the Governing Body papers here.



In October 2016, the CCG launched a public consultation on the reduction of community hospital beds in the Eastern locality of Devon, accompanied by the development of a model of care throughout Northern, Eastern and Western Devon, designed to shift the focus of services to integrated local care in people's own homes. The consultation ran from 7 October 2016 until 6 January 2017, with a focus on proposals to provide more care and support for elderly and frail people at home and in the community...

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

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Acute Services Review: Next steps

As you may know Devon's Acute Services Review (ASR) was announced on 4 November 2016, when the final draft of the five-year Wider-Devon Sustainability and Transformation Plan was published. The detailed case for change is set out on the websites of NHS NEW Devon CCG and South Devon and Torbay CCG.

This Plan sets out why we need to transform health and care services across Devon. It has seven main priorities, one of which is to secure clinically and financially sustainable acute hospital services across Devon.

Acute services are currently provided for the people of Devon by our four major hospitals (in Barnstaple, Exeter, Plymouth and Torbay). The review will have three parts:

1. Examine the gaps in our current acute services and/or whether we

- 2. Identify those acute services that are vulnerable because of workforce shortages, or other challenges and which are at risk of becoming unsustainable in the near future.

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New diabetes education service

NHS Northern, Eastern and Western Devon Clinical Commissioning Group has announced the launch of an free innovative education service for people newly diagnosed with type 2 diabetes in Devon's Eastern* locality.

The Oviva Diabetes Education programme is now available for all newly diagnosed people with type 2 diabetes throughout Eastern Devon, extending from Okehampton to Axminster to Tiverton. It provides a unique new approach to helping boost access to learning about diabetes and improving people's confidence in managing their condition.

The new service involves offering patients a telephone appointment with a dietitian to create a personal plan, and participating in a face-to-face group session to learn about what changes people living with type 2 diabetes can make to control their condition. Patients participating in the service will also benefit from access to online learning and advice about other local services to support them in improving their health.



Tackling eating disorders



Eating disorders affect about 800,000 people in the UK and can affect people of any age. The National Institute of Health and Clinical Excellence estimates about 89 per cent of those affected by an eating disorder are female.

The main eating disorders are anorexia nervosa, bulimia and binge eating disorder (BED) and it is estimated that, of those with eating disorders, 10 per cent are anorexic, 40 per cent are bulimic and the rest fall into the EDNOS (Eating Disorders Not Otherwise Specified) category which includes BED.

Devon Partnership NHS Trust provides treatment and support for people affected by eating disorders and Andy Wray, from specialist services, said: "During Eating Disorders Awareness Week in March every year we aim to encourage anyone who is concerned about a friend or relative to ask them to talk to their doctor before their illness reaches a serious

stage. That first step is often a difficult one, but the earlier someone can enter treatment for an eating disorder, the greater their chance of recovery.

Move to improve stroke rehabilitation services in East Devon

Plans to integrate the stroke rehabilitation unit

New resources for patients and professionals on inhaler use

The medicines optimisation team at NHS NEW Devon CCG has produced a number of pages on the CCG website with useful resources for patients and healthcare professionals, including help for patients on using prescribed inhalers correctly.



Who they are for?

Patients, carers and healthcare professionals who have a respiratory condition or care for someone who has a respiratory condition.

What information is included?

When diagnosed with Asthma, COPD or another respiratory

condition, an inhaler may be prescribed. This information will help patients and healthcare professionals with the correct inhaler technique.

Inhalers will be a metered dose inhaler (MDI) or dry powder inhaler(DPI), and the action required - whether you breathe in slowly and deeply; or strongly and deeply - will depend on which inhaler has been prescribed.

There are explanatory videos on the website along with a checklist for each type of inhaler. These **checklists** describe step by step how to use the inhaler correctly and can be viewed and downloaded here.

CQC notes significant improvement and rates Devon's mental health services as 'good'

The provider of the county's mental health and learning disability services has been awarded an overall rating of 'good' by the Care Quality Commission (CQC).



The services inspected at Devon Partnership NHS
Trust in December 2016 were rated as 'good'
across the board in the five domains assessed by the CQC: safe,
effective, caring, responsive and well-led. Among these the secure
service, which is based at Langdon in Dawlish, received a rating of
'outstanding' for its responsiveness.

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New renal unit for North Devon patients



Barrie Petts was one of the first patients to try out the new unit. He has had dialysis at South Molton for the past six years and previously travelled to Exeter for treatment.

A new satellite renal facility offering dialysis treatment has opened in Barnstaple.

The new unit replaces existing facilities in South Molton, which no longer met the needs of the growing service. The RD&E awarded Fresenius Medical Care the contact to equip and manage the unit.

The purpose-built facility at Roundswell includes 20 state-of-the-art dialysis stations which can provide treatment for up to 60 patients a day. Read more here

Northern Devon Healthcare NHS Trust has launched a new cancer screening service this month.


The bowel scope screening service is part of the NHS Bowel Cancer Screening Programme and will take place in the endoscopy unit at North Devon District Hospital.

Proposals for congenital heart disease services

NHS England has launched a consultation on proposals regarding the future commissioning of congenital heart disease (CHD) services for children and adults nationally.



The proposals were published in July 2016 and describe steps to ensure a consistent standard of care for CHD patients across the country, for now and for the future.

NHS England is proposing a national service standards at every hospital that provides CHD services. The effect of the proposals, if implemented, will be that some hospitals will carry out more CHD surgery and catheter procedures, while others, which do not meet the relevant standards, will stop doing this work.

The consultation launched on 9 February and runs until 5 June, and provides information about the proposals, and the potential impact they may have, if implemented, on the delivery of services, and to seek views through webinars, face-to-face events and online.

University Hospitals Bristol is the South West centre, but is not directly

affected by the proposals.

Highlighting the risk of prenatal infection



Raising awareness of the risks of group B strep to unborn and new babies was a key theme of a campaign by health charity Group B Strep Support (GPSS).

The charity based its campaign on the fact that February was International Prenatal Infection Prevention Month, and used it to promote information aimed at educating and empowering mums to be.

Many women carry group B Strep naturally, It usually causes no problems, but can be devastating. It is the most common cause of serious infection in newborns and meningitis in babies under three months. Most Group B Strep infections in babies are preventable and knowing about it can help to protect unborn babies...

Be Tick Aware when out and about this Spring

While out and about this summer, Devon County Council's Public Health team is reminding people to be 'tick aware' as they enjoy the great outdoors.



The message comes as the Devon Nature Partnership's Naturally Healthy campaign springs into action, alongside a host of activities to get people out and about in their natural surroundings.

Dr Virginia Pearson, Devon's Director of Public Health, said: "Ticks are something many pet owners are already aware of, and know how to deal with, but as many of us take to the moors, woodlands and coastal paths to enjoy our beautiful scenery and fresh air, we are more likely to come

into contact with ticks, and need to be aware what to look for.

"Ticks are tiny spider-like creatures and are found in woodlands, parks and gardens. They are most prevalent in late spring, summer and autumn. Lyme disease is a bacterial infection which is transmitted by tick bites. Often the only symptom of Lyme disease is a rash, which gradually spreads from the site of the tick bite. The rash can cover a large area and last for weeks if left untreated. Some patients may also have flu-like symptoms.

Child sexual exploitation awareness 2017

Plymouth, Torbay, Cornwall and Devon Safeguarding Children Boards have teamed up to promote awareness of Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) to parents.



To coincide with Child Sexual Exploitation Awareness Day on 18 March, led by national charity Network Group (NWG), all the Boards, working with Devon and Cornwall Police, local authorities and charities including Barnado's, NSPCC and and NHS Northern, Eastern and Western Devon Clinical Commissioning Group (NEW Devon CCG), are making parents aware of what signs to look out for in case their child is at risk of being sexually exploited.

Sexual exploitation is a type of child abuse. It puts a young person at huge risk of damage to their physical, emotional and psychological health. Signs to look out for include unexplained gifts or money, excessive or secretive use of mobile phone, self-harm, significantly older friends or playing truant/going missing.

Services offer place to say goodbye after loss of a baby

Anyone who has experienced the loss of a baby, whether through miscarriage, still-birth or death in infancy, is invited to 'saying goodbye' services in Exeter and Plymouth next month.

The services are being organised by the charity
Mariposa Trust which supports people who have
lost babies at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or
in infancy. It was founded in 2012, by Zoe and
Andy Clark-Coates, who saw a critical lack of support for people like
them, who had gone through baby loss.



With more than 258,000 babies lost annually in the UK alone, the charity aims to offer befriending and support and organises remembrance

services called Saying Goodbye Services, for people to join together and remember the children they have lost.

The next one is on 8 April at 130pm in Exeter Cathedral, and following that there is a service at St Andrew's Minster, Plymouth, on 29 April at 4pm.
