Pati nce is a virtue

Apparently pa ence is a virtue, but yesterday I would have rather had a helicopter. It took me an hour and forty minutes to get from Okehampton to the M5. I was a emp ng to drive to Bath to collect my son who had spent a fantas c week at a sports camp with his cousins. In the end, a two hour journey took me four and a half, and I missed his award ceremony. Annoying. Most of my delay was caused by mere weight of tra c on a busy August Friday a ernoon. I had to drop something off at Okehampton first, which didn't help either. I had washed all the carpets in our house, so I was returning one of those carpet cleaning machines you can hire. So forget "pa ence is a virtue!" "Cleanliness is next to godliness."

It's been a summer to learn pa ence, I think. For various reasons this summer, I seem to have done a lot of long car journeys, and we have a few more planned before the schools go back in September. Then there is the great pa ence tes ng Bri sh summer - chilly and wet. I hope the situa on has changed considerably by the me this is published, but so far we seem to have had very few completely rain-free days. So the pa ence of many a parent is being tested this summer. How many "wet weather op ons" does our area have to off r? At least North Tawton school swimming pool has been open a lot, and used by many weather-bound families this summer. As for the farmers wan ng to get crops in, I pray that by the time this is read a weather window of more than a couple of days has opened so that harves ng can get done... pa ence, pa ence!

Perhaps a dis nc on is called for here, because there is pa ence and pa ence, surely. Ge ng stuck staring at the back of a dirty van on the A30 for over an hour is annoying really it is. It required great amounts of pa ence. But I got through it, eventually, and my friends Ed Sheeran, Pink Floyd, Radio 2 and U2 (of course) were quite good company in the process. I might have even woken up this morning more virtuous a er my experience. My wife would probably disagree. Then there is a whole other level of pa ence that life demands at mes, such as the pa ence needed by the farming community this summer as they have had to stare out of the farmhouse window not at dirty vans, but at all too clean combines and tractors being gently washed by the persistent drizzle. Pa ence when livelihood depends on it is undoubtedly more virtuous than tra c jam pa ence. I am reminded of another example of life-demanding pa ence that I witnessed this summer: the pa ent hope etched on the faces of line a er line of soldiers wai ng for rescue on the beaches of northern France. (If you are stuck for something to do on a chilly wet evening over the next few weeks, I highly recommend catching the film Dunkirk before it leaves the big screen - magnifi ent, mesmeric, and

miraculous.)

So, yes, there is surely something virtuous about growing in pa ence. It is a great Chris an virtue, men oned numerous mes in the Bible, and of which Jesus is the supreme example. He pa ently waits 30 years before star ng his ministry. He acts with kindness, forgiveness and great pa ence towards his disciples, who for the majority of their friendship, are slow to understand him, not realising the true signifi ance of his ministry. UI mately, his pa ent suff ring leads him to the cross to die in our place, and as we are often slow to respond to him his pa ence extends even towards you and me also. As the Apostle Peter wrote, "bear in mind the Lord's pa ence means salva on" (2 Peter 3:15).

It probably shouldn't take a tra c jam to highlight this to me, but perhaps we could all work on a li le pa ence as we head into the busyness of autumn and a new school term. The phrase "pa ence is a virtue" does not in fact come from the Bible; neither for that ma er does the phrase "cleanliness is next to godliness". The first comes from an ancient 5th century Chris an poem, and the second is from a John Wesley sermon in the 18th century. So pa ence is a Chris an virtue, a fruit of the Spirit according to the Apostle Paul (Gala ans 5:22). But I think anyone of any faith would agree the world needs more of it. We live in impa ent days, and we all find it unpleasant - someone jumping a queue, another ge ng unnecessarily angry at some minor inconvenience. Impa ence turns the atmosphere to Bri sh summer - chilly. The trouble is, as much as we are experts at spo ng it in someone else, we o en miss it in ourselves. So let's work on our pa ence, all of us. I even read recently that people should work on their pa ence like they workout their bodies! Like Zumba for our souls, we should exercise our pa ence muscles by, for example, placing fi y coins on the floor and carefully pick them up one by one, or taking a thick book we should pa ently turn over each page, making a mark with a pencil on every one. Why not? (I can think of few reasons why not!) Be er s II - clean the carpets at home! Now, that would be worthwhile Zumba for the soul! And you get a clean house for it too. Virtuous and godly!

Dogs and Dog Fouling – Letherens Lane and Yeo Lane, North Tawton

The Council has received complaints about dogs in the above areas not on leads, and also about dog fouling not being picked up by dog owners. The majority of local dog owners are thoughtful and responsible in keeping dogs under control and making sure that they always pick up and dispose of dog fouling. We would just like to remind owners who sometimes forget, that Letherens Lane and Yeo Lane are areas where dogs are required to be kept under control and are areas where dog fouling must be picked up and properly disposed of. If dogs are let off the lead to run freely it is not easy for owners to keep track of where they may have fouled, or to ensure that dogs are not causing a nuisance or posing a danger to other people. As far as the law is concerned, dog owners may not be aware that there is an £80.00 fixed penalty charge for not picking up and properly disposing of dog fouling and that a dog can be deemed to be 'dangerous' if it is dangerously out of control in a public place or if a person is 'in fear of being bitten'. For information, there is a dog waste bin close to the entrance to Letherens Lane from Fore Street, and similarly in Yeo Lane.

Public Art – Wainhomes Section 106 monies

In July we advised residents that there is a sum of money available for 'public art', and we asked for suggestions as to what people would like to see this funding used for. For information, the sum in question is £21k. Thank you to those residents who responded with ideas and suggestions. We would now like to form a Working Group to agree on proposals to put to the Council, and so we are looking for volunteers to be part of this group. Nick Alford has accepted our invitation to introduce himself through the pages of "Roundabout". We welcome him as he moves with his family into the district and becomes the new Head of our school:

I'm delighted to be taking over as headteacher of North Tawton Community Primary School in September. For me this is a really exciting opportunity and I hope I will be able to work with the school community to continue to raise standards and ensure the children of North Tawton are being given the best possible start in life.

As well as taking on my second headship, this marks a return to Devon for me. I spent my formative years growing up in Hatherleigh and attended Okehampton School before going on to Exeter College and then university. What's been lovely on my visits to North Tawton, is coming across people who remember me from my school days and realising that nearly everyone knows someone you know too, albeit at times in a roundabout way.

When I start work in September it will be 24 years since I qualified as a teacher from Loughborough University. I started my career in Weston-super-Mare before moving to London in 1996. Initially I worked at a very large urban school in quite a deprived area of west London before becoming a deputy head at a junior school near Harrow. From there I moved to my headship at Glebe Primary School in the London Borough of Hillingdon where I have worked for 11 years. In that time the school expanded from two to three forms of entry and pupils number went from 240 to 550. I led Glebe through three successful Ofsted inspections and significant improvements in SATs results. The school also had a full rebuild which culminated in a royal opening. However, for me the greatest achievement was making the school a really happy and safe place for the children to come and learn every day and ensuring the school was a central part of the local community.

My philosophy on education is pretty simple; I want children to feel positive about coming in to school every day and develop a love of learning, whether it be in the classroom or through the wider curriculum. I do expect children to work hard and have high expectations of themselves so that they are well prepared for the next stage of their education and their future lives. I'm a great believer in having high aspirations and encouraging children to have ambition, whatever it may be.

One of the great joys of headship for me is getting to know the families that make up the school community. To this end you will see me on the school gate each day and I'm always happy to chat or resolve any concerns you may have. I'll also do my best to get to know your children as individuals by popping into lessons and chatting to them on the playground.

I'm very much look forward to working with the staff and governing body at North Tawton. From my initial visits to the school I can see that we have an excellent and dedicated group of people educating the children and I hope I will be able to work closely with them all to ensure standards are high and the outcomes for the children are the best they can be.

I'll be moving down to Devon with my wife, Ruh and our two children. Niall is 13 and Amelia is three. We launched a new website for Sampford Courtenay in January 2017. The expanded site includes informa on on local events and acti i es, reports from the parish council, news and views from residents, ps for visitors and a range of fascina ng photos of Sampford Courtenay past and present. I have been monitoring visits to the site since the beginning of March. During that me there have been approximately 11,600 page views in about 3,000 sessions. As this will be Mrs. Bevis's (and Cllr. Robin Bevis) last meeting – Cllr. Coleman wished to express thanks to both of them on behalf of SCPC for their hard work and loyal support over the past years.

<u>WDBC Report</u> - in the absence of both councillors, the Clerk read out an email from Cllr. Louise Watts :

Hub meeting 18.7.17 to discuss merger of South Hams and WDBC – to generate substantial savings in operating costs. Cllr. Coleman would like to know what does "merger" mean? If it is a reduction of officers and buildings he is in favour of the move, however, if it

means a reduction in elected members he hopes that the two administrations will be warded to maintain a fair balance for both areas.

- Audit Committee no major surprises with WDBC showing a small revenue underspend compared to budget.
- Garden Waste scheme up and running with first collections at end of July. However, there have been some issues with trying to register on line which the council are aware of.
- Garden Waste Scheme Village Bag? a member of the parish is concerned that leaves from the Churchyard fall onto his property although he has no garden himself, and did not feel prepared to pay for garden waste bags for waste from neighbouring property. Cllr. Friend reported that Cllr. McInnes suggested that DCC will provide a Village Bag for rubbish on the highway. Clerk to contact him for details.

Clir. Thorley also reported that at the Eastern Links meeting it was suggested that a group of neighbours could group together and share the cost of registering for the Garden Waste Scheme. However, bags would have to be registered to just one address to be collected.

Planning

2221/17/COM – Notification under electronic communications for proposed replacement of 3no existing antennae with 3no new antennae. Comments by 27th July

Clir Coleman had printed off copies of the above plans to consider at the meeting. He also commented that the Planning Portal on WDBC is showing marked improvement. However, it would still be better if all documents pertaining to a particular planning application could be put together in a Zip file that could be downloaded rather than having to download each document individually.

With reference to the above application – councillors unanimously supported the improvements but would like some indication of how long the work will take and whether the works will adversely affect the Wi Fi signal for any prolonged period.

Builders' Yard – The Clerk had received a late email from Mr. Chris Miles-Ash, outlining his plans for building works on the piece of land known as "Builders' Yard". Cllrs. will wait on receipt of full plans from WDBC before making any comments.

WDBC Decisions :-

2935/16/COU – Land at Beacon Cross Farm – Mr Holman = **Refusal**

Phone boxes

SCPC definitive position (Cllr. D. Boting Page) – Cllr . Boting Page presented a report of the current state of all 3 BT phone boxes within the parish. As the Clerk had received no communication from members of the public since the last meeting a vote was taken on the best way forward with this issue.

Belstone Corner phone box – Phone out of order, very poor condition, located on a corner with poor sight lines for safe use. **Majority vote to REMOVE.**

Sampford Chapple phone box – Phone out of order, poor condition, located on fast stretch of road but with reasonable sight lines. **Majority vote to RETAIN.**

Village Square phone box – Phone working (card only), reasonable condition, located in good position.

Majority vote to RETAIN. It was agreed to bring this to the next Open Meeting in October, and Cllr. McIlwraith offered to try and communicate with both OFCOM and BT to clarify how to proceed in time for the Open Meeting.

Possible purchase of Defibrillators for phone boxes – Cllr. Coleman reported that a member of the public had offered to finance the purchase of a defibrillator for the parish. Cllr. McIwraith offered to look into the cost and implications involved and this matter would be added to Agenda for Autumn Open Meeting

Eastern Links meeting.

- **Eastern Links Meeting report** (Cllr. A. Thorley) **No representative from the police**
 - **Broadband** a representative from <u>CDS</u> reported that Sampford Courtenay is covered in Phase 2/Lot 4 just awarded to Airband. Plus anyone with unused vouchers now has until the end of September to use them. If you go to the Connecting Devon and Somerset page you can input your postcode and it will give you more information.
 - **WDBC** <u>their Annual Report</u> can be accessed via their website.

Garden Waste – If you can use some of the old white garden waste bags they are available at the Okehampton Council Offices cost £1 each.

- Dartmoor National Park <u>Moor Otters</u> have you come across the Moor Otters leaflets (available at Waitrose and other outlets). There are 100 different Otter models sited around the Dartmoor area and there is an Otter Trail, and you can take part in an online bid to win one of them. For more details use the above link.
- **TAP funding** any applications will be considered at the November meeting.
- **Highways** need to appoint a new signage contractor; therefore, there is a waiting list for already approved new signs.
- **Speed Control** several neighbouring parishes discussed the possibility of jointly purchasing a mobile radar system that shows a smiling or frowning face depending on your speed. This could be moved around different parishes to try and address speed issues.
- **Community Speed Watch** there is currently a waiting list for this training. (SCPC is on the list). However, Whiddon Down reported that it is a good course. They suggested that if parishioners are concerned about the prospect of penalising neighbours who are speeding – parishes to speed check each other to avoid this.

".....you will bring my grey head down to the grave with sorrow." (Genesis 42 verse 38).

Be good to your children: they will choose your Care Home. A sombre thought when a recent report by the Care Quality Commission (CQC) tells that a third of Care Homes fail to provide safe levels of care. That is a poor comment on our society today. Another is that we need a COC to monitor how the vulnerable, elderly, sick and lonely are being treated. Are the human qualities of loving care, of decent treatment for others, becoming so widely overlooked that they need regular official inspection? How much time, effort and money is spent in training staff to inspect and report on the treatment of the vulnerable? In effect, to assess the absence of human kindness and love to the elderly? And what a pity this is the case when Care Home Staff are not among the best paid in our society and so many of them are devoted to the work they do.

And while it is easy to blame the staff at some Care Homes for their behaviour, there are other aspects to the matter of care provision. A lady running a Care Home reported that many of her charges were lucky if they received a visit from a relative once a year.

Parents take great care in choosing schools for their children and in keeping in touch with school to monitor continuing progress. It would be good if a similar enthusiasm were shown for their children's grandparents when they are moved into a Care Home. When choosing a school, parents are well advised to visit it and sense the atmosphere in it for themselves. Will it be a place where their children will thrive and be happy? The advice from CQC to visit a prospective care home to "check the smell" is appealing to a similar instinctive "feel". Will the elderly inmate be happy and thrive in these surroundings?

The tradition has gone whereby several generations of the same family lived together in the same house and the elderly relatives were cared for within the family. Children leave home in pursuit of education and employment far away and are not always able to live within easy travelling distance of their aging parents, whether they live in a Care Home or in their own home. So the Care Home staff member becomes as responsible for the elderly folk as the school teacher is responsible for young pupils during the school day. Yet when the children go home to the care of their parents, the Care Home staff remains "on duty" around the clock. It is a labour of love, requiring patience, understanding and commitment of a special order.

We must be thankful that two thirds of those working in this way are found to be doing a good job. But, until a similar attitude can be found throughout all our care homes, remember the advice about being good to your Uncle Jack children.

In December 2014, the Board of Trustees considered four major issues facing the Women's Section: falling membership, decline in income, the introduction of the Comradeship Data base and the ratio of administrative to welfare spend. In March 2015, the Chairman of the Women's Section presented a report to the Board of Trustees detailing actions which the Women's Section was taking to address those issues. On 26th May 2015, the then national Vice Chairman and the then Director General met the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Women's Section to discuss possible options and identify areas of concern. At all times during this ongoing process the Women's Section Chairman, Vice Chairman and their central committee have been involved and consulted.

In "From the Rectory" in April, Nick Weldon outlined a partnership scheme St. Peter's Church is undertaking to support five different organisations over the next three years. Previous editions of "Roundabout" have given details of four of them.

This month, Nick tells us about the final organisation for which he is acting as the champion.

Morning Star Ministries

Reg. Charity No. 1120888



Morning Star Ministries has a long association with the churches and chapels of West Devon, including North Street Chapel in North Tawton. At St. Peter's we have been pleased to support them for the last 10 years as well, and with the advent of the St. Peter's Partnership in March this year, we have been pleased to increase our commitment to their work in prayer and financial giving. Morning Star Ministries is based in Punjab, India, and works with local people to share the good news of Jesus, relieve poverty, provide education, and promote healthy living in the poorest communities of India. Englishman Roger Berrie set up Morning Star over 20 years ago. Since then, the project has transformed the lives of multiple young people by lifting them out of the dust of India's slums.

At their base, Morning Star Church, they hold regular worship services and Bible studies for over 100 people. New churches have been planted in the surrounding area in recent years. They also have a fellowship group at a local charitable hospital where they hold Bible studies, do chaplaincy visits for patients and provide pastoral support to staff. Morning Star Ministries also hosts a residential school for children from nearby slums across two sites. Currently, they have 40 children living at the school, and a further 40 who attend the day school, plus 4 in further education. Morning Star believes that providing education is a crucial element in lifting people out of poverty and empowering them to succeed in life. They follow the regional School Education Board syllabus so the children can obtain nationally recognised qualifications at GCSE and 'A' level equivalent. The oldest boy Raj, after enrolling at College to do 'A' levels said, "When I was little, my mum and I used to beg outside this place. I never dreamed I would be studying here". Having completed 'A' levels and a certificate in Theology. Raj is now undertaking a rehabilitation course with a view to working to help the marginalised. They facilitate health care for the children in the school. All the children receive necessary vaccinations and over twenty of them have been treated successfully for T.B.. They also host dental clinics, vaccination clinics and heart check clinics, to which members of the community are invited as well. In addition they facilitate health care for other individuals who are known to them who would not be able to access suitable care without assistance. which might be financial or knowledge based.

Three years ago Morning Star flew Surjeet, a young paraplegic man to Chennai for a life saving operation and four months of rehabilitation. His brother Parmjeet is a medical worker for Morning Star. He ministers basic health care to the children and others in need.

Recently Morning Star has completed a project to build a new complex where they can accommodate up to 70 young people, and educate up to 200.
