Why help kestrels?

• Kestrels are listed as 'amber' UK conservation status which means that their breeding population is in decline, and they have declined significantly across Devon. A nestbox will help them have a safe place to rear their young.




Where to place the boxes?

- The nestboxes should be fixed to trees away from dense woodland close to rough grassland and with good visibility.
 Mature hedgerow trees are an ideal site or they can be fixed to poles or the exterior of barns in undisturbed locations.
- They should be 15-20 feet above the ground, with the opening pointing away from the prevailing weather.



Make your own nestbox

• The RSPB has an easy to follow nestbox plan that can be made out of durable timber (larch, cedar, oak) or 18mm exterior grade plywood which will need to be varnished/treated with a non-toxic timber sealant and on the exterior (only), especially on the edges and corners to make it weatherproof.
