Good news! Great joy!

This Christmas will be strange, but it needn't be without hope. "Do not fear. I bring good news of great joy for all people," said the Angel to the shepherds outside Bethlehem on that wonderful night (Luke 2:10). After a year of bad news, little joy and much fear, we are all begging for the light of hope this Christmas. Christmas will be different this year. I'm not quite sure how yet, writing this in mid November, mid 2nd lockdown. I guess big family gatherings will probably not happen, not in person anyway. Getting a booking for Christmas dinner at a pub could be tricky. The annual rituals of Christmas markets, pantos, school nativity plays, and carol services will not be the same one way or another. On line, on hold, or on mute will be the order of the day, sadly. (I say sadly, but I suspect there might actually be a touch of gladness in the sadness for some...a quiet Christmas for once, just like the quiet Spring of 2020 that many secretly enjoyed.)

Undoubtedly, regardless of how things turn out this festive season, things will seem a bit darker than previous years. My prayer then, is that the light of hope will shine all the brighter. In a year when it feels like so much has changed, the good news of great joy at the heart of Christmas has not. Much as I enjoyed this text doing the rounds in my family this year... No Nativity this year. The Wise Men face a travel ban. The shepherds have been furloughed. The Inn Keeper has shut under tier 3 regulations. Herod doesn't do Zoom, and the Angels can't fly after sanitising their wings with hand gel. Santa won't be working as he would break the rule of 6 with Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Donner and Blitzen. As for Rudolf with that red nose, he's isolating and waiting for a test.... it's not true! Still this year, there is good news of great joy for all people. Christ has been born, "born to you" as the Angel announced, the greatest of Christmas presents.

At our churches we have been thinking, praying and discussing at length about how we might do Christmas this year. Although I was tempted for a brief moment to scale everything back and settle for a quiet one this year, that would not be right. Everyone is in need of a boost, and the good news of great joy cannot be restricted. So we hope to run as full a programme as possible throughout December, but how things will turn out, we don't know. It depends what the unlocking in December will look like.

We have decided to plan in the usual services and events in the hope that most things will happen in some form or other. As you can see on page XX, there will be two Christingle services, followed by carol services in all four churches, and further services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. I am fairly confident we will be open for services again in December, but I cannot guarantee it at the

moment. If congregations can come back, social distancing will have to be maintained between households, so this will reduce the capacity in church for some services. Fortunately, most of our buildings are big, and so even a socially distanced congregation is still a reasonable size. The churches will be cleaned regularly and the air will be circulated (they are always draughty anyway!). I'm sure face-coverings will either be mandatory or highly recommended, hand sanitizer will be available, and track and trace will be operating.

So the message is, please come and celebrate Christmas with us, but please be prepared for it to be a bit different. It may be that the choir and musicians are the only ones allowed to sing. It may be that we have to limit numbers inside. Rest assured, we will do all we can to make it as safe as possible for as many as possible. We have decided a couple of things already. Services will be shorter to limit the time indoors, and we are going to film the main carol services, making them available online. So whether there are congregations present or not, there will be local carol services for you to enjoy this Christmas.

The service that is proving the hardest to plan is the 4 p.m. Christmas Eve Nativity Service in North Tawton. This service has grown hugely in recent years to be a treasured part of Christmas for dozens of families. We love it, and so does the Fountain (!) for afterwards there is always "no room in the inn." But for obvious reasons, 250 people crammed in church with little angels and shepherds flying around would not be possible or wise regardless of the kind of unlocking we get in December. But we will do something at 4 p.m. on Christmas Eve. We may take the whole service outside this year into the churchyard. And I can conceive that we may be forced to do the same for other services too where possible. So, as well as "come", the message is also "keep checking for updates." Check the website below, check social media, check notice boards, and check emails if you are on the village email lists in Sampford Courtenay and Bondleigh.

However Christmas shapes up this year, the heart of it is unchanged since that holy night in Bethlehem. Light still shines into the darkness, and hope still rises in our hearts, for God has come as man. Christ has been born to us, and a fearful world has its Saviour. Whatever the circumstances this year, this is still good news of great joy for all. Let's not let Covid crash Christmas.

Vacancy on the Council

The first step in filling a councillor vacancy is to advertise the opportunity for electors to request an election. West Devon Borough Council did not receive any requests within the specified deadline, therefore NTTC can bring the 'Co-Option' process into being. We'll advertise on our noticeboard and website in the New Year. Full information will be available for residents at that time.

Criminal Damage in the Memorial Park

Many of you will be aware of the criminal damage caused to the trampoline in the park. Despite the Council reacting swiftly to put up safety fencing, just a couple of days later the fencing was moved and yet more mindless damage caused. If anyone had tried to use the trampoline there was a very serious risk of harm if they fell onto the metal surround where safety pads had been prised up. We had to spend a much bigger sum of money on a large metal plate to cover the whole of the trampoline, to make it inaccessible. The end costs of dealing with this damage will now be in the region of one thousand pounds.

- **One thousand pounds of the hard earned money of North Tawton residents –** there is no 'magic money tree', the Council's budget comes directly from residents as an extra to their Council Tax; not from the Government from you.
- **One thousand pounds** that could have provided replacement of some of the wooden play equipment, or many other projects to benefit our residents.

We are all aware of the publicity around families in hardship – how many children's meals could be paid for with **one thousand pounds**?

If you have information as to those responsible, please contact the Town Clerk.

Watercourses – Riparian Duties

If you 'own' a watercourse – which can be anything from a river to a ditch – you have certain duties to keep it free-flowing. This is very important, as blockages can cause flooding. You may own a watercourse if you have one on the boundary of your property – your deeds should tell you. For more information, try googling 'gov.uk owning a watercourse'.

Safety of pedestrians on dark evenings

I've had a couple of comments about people out walking after dark, wearing dark clothing, and t herefore being very difficult to see. You may not be aware of how invisible you are to motorists – please try wearing light coloured clothing, carry a torch, or best of all wear a hi-vis belt or cross-body strap. Available for under £5 from Amazon for example, these could save you from an accident.

Cyclists

Again, I have had some complaints about cyclists travelling extremely fast and causing a potential hazard to pedestrians – please take care, and if possible have a warning bell that you can ring.

Once again please could I ask residents not to park on this area – it causes problems for our contractors trying to access the park with machinery, and makes manoeuvring in and out of the car park difficult.

Covid 19

I remind residents that our community help group is still in existence. We have volunteers who can help with shopping, collecting prescriptions, maybe you just need a someone for a friendly chat – have a look at your new emergency leaflet for contact details, or contact the Town Clerk. We may be able to point you in the direction of other sources of assistance, so again please contact us. Please keep safe.

Sampford Courtenay – Past, Present and Future – An Idea

I've had this churning in my mind for some time – the idea to get a group of like-minded people together to focus on where we live, who lived here before us (in our houses and Parish) and what their lives were like – it's all about that sense of **'place and belonging'** which is vital to feeling good about things and so important at times like this.

Sampford Courtenay and Honeychurch (*abbreviated to SC from now on*) are both rich in history and we are fortunate to have 'The Orange Book' (Sampford Courtenay and Honeychurch, 2003 Stephanie Pouya) as a reference source of high quality.... but how many of us can say that we've read it and know much of the detail?

All of us in the Parish know something about what has happened here in the past including, of course, the Prayer Book Rebellion. What, though, do we know about the wells, the crosses, the schools, the halls, the Church, the Chapel, the roads, the railway and station, local industry etc? Where were the Church bells cast – probably in a sand pit in the Village, but where? Where was the stone quarried for the buildings? What did it feel like to live in our Parish at particular times in the past? What are the times in history which felt most like those we are experiencing now with this Covid-19 pandemic? How will future generations look back on what is happening now? We are all contributing to the future history of our Parish. I though that it would be interesting to tap into the knowledge of people who live here - and others - and to link this to what we want for the future of our Parish (the place and our community) and to the wider issues of climate change and the responsibility that we all have to look after the best of what we've got for future generations and for our little part of the world generally. So ... Sampford Courtenay – Past, Present and Future.

We have the immediate challenges of coping with the virus as well as raising the funding for the Village Hall roof and window which is an incredibly valuable resource for our community and a legacy for future Parishioners. I am a mere parishioner, not a Parish Councillor or someone on the Village Hall Committee (and all credit to those folks for doing what they do), just someone looking to give everyone a means of pulling the threads together. The SCPC Parish Priorities include a lot of what is here; The Village Hall Committee has a clear focus to preserve the building and to ensure that it is a thriving centre of our Parish Community. I see this as a very special way - and time - for us all to come together for the greater good. There are a couple of things people might want to do during this time when social activities and travel are limited and which could be interesting for us all in the future. These are my initial thoughts, but feel free to come up with your own:

The Past of Sampford Courtenay and Honeychurch Parishes - 'Making the history 'real'

- Research your own home and its history and produce a 'timeline' for your house Summarise the exciting bits. When was it built? Who lived there and when? What did they do for a living? Any significant changes since it was built and why? Any funny events or happenings? Try to include 2 or 3 photos or illustrations. We don't need an essay, anything from a paragraph or list of bullet points and no more than 2 pages. Once we've got several of these, we will display them, possibly even put them together in a second 'Orange book'; We might get our tech-savvy folks to interview some of the characters about their homes and their memories and experiences in the Parish.
- We will feature (with permission, of course) some of these on the Village website and who knows where else? Some people who've already heard a bit about this are keen to form a SC **History group**. One of their activities could be to do a timeline for the Parish and, again, tell the story in a way that brings our past alive. If you have a favourite time in SC's history or a key date that you'd like to research and present (again, possibly on two sides of A4 maximum) then please let us know by emailing <u>SCPCClerk@aol.com</u>.
- The Prayer Book Rebellion in 1549 is probably SC's main claim to fame even if it was about people falling out. They had strong beliefs and stuck up for what they thought was right but how much more was there to it? We could hold a '**Re-enactment**' event and tell the story so that more of us can understand what it was all about. The **Present** is about continuing to look after each other and the Community generally at the moment.
 - We need to select the best of what has been happening and make sure that it continues. I am sure we all appreciate the efforts of those who have made things happen locally. Thank you!
 - What do you or a group you belong to feel we need and how can you contribute to making sure that as many of us as possible are, even if not happy, then at least 'in touch' with each other and that we are healthy? I'd like to challenge each person and group (however formal or informal Grumpies, the WI, Book Clubs, Flower Society etc.) within the Parish to ask themselves what they can do now to help others and what they want going forward. What can your group do to contribute to SC: Past, Present and Future?

The Future section of my thinking is still largely about 'Community'

- The Village Hall roof etc. We need to raise £150,000 to preserve the legacy for future generations.
- The SC Environment and Sustainability (SCEnSus) group's monthly challenges, recently published for November, December and January, to ensure that we are looking after the environment and climate locally and globally.
- Again, all individuals and groups to **think about what we want for the Parish and Villages going forward**. Are there other groups which would be popular possibilities suggested include: Photography; Art & Craft; Film Club; Ready, Steady, Cook type events; Dancing (remember those pre-Covid sessions?); a regular Walking group; reinstating the Village's annual outing? What else would you like to see and what can you do to help get things started?

Thank you for reading this far. This is an exciting time for us within the Parish even though the virus and the dark days of autumn going into winter might have left us feeling a bit jaded. Now is the time to get going with some of the suggestions here and to look forward to brighter times – Who knows to what it might lead for all of us?

Climate Change Challenges for everybody (and every household) in the Sampford Courtney Parish

It is vital that we all understand the impact we are having on the environment and the effects of climate change and to change the way we do things to make a real difference at local and global levels. If you didn't see it, try to watch David

Attenborough's Extinction programme – BBC1 13th September 2020. The Sampford Courtenay Environment and Sustainability (SCEnSus) group have identified a set of **monthly challenges** to create a community response which will have a much greater impact on the environment and climate than anything we can do individually. The idea is that each challenge will build on the one that's gone before so that the changes become a way of life, not just something you focus on for a month and then forget about!

The challenge for January is in the form of a **New Year's Resolution checklist** which will help everyone in your household identify the areas that are your particular priorities. The other months have topics that we all need to work on to reduce our carbon footprint. The aim is to make us think about the issues and how we can make that much-needed difference! The Government is bringing in legislation to stimulate change. Did you know that from February 2021 you won't be allowed by law to buy 'wet' wood (more than 20% moisture) or bagged household coal? Wood for domestic burning either has to be dry and seasoned or bought wet and stored on your property until it is dry and seasoned – up to 2 years! Other legislation is already in place for diesel and petrol cars, carbon offsetting requirements and, from 2021 until 2024, the new Environmental Land Management Scheme (ELMS) will come into effect for Farmers. Also, that from March 2022 you won't be able to buy or use Metaldehyde slug pellets (the blue ones!). These changes will each affect the majority of us in the Parish in some way or another. A useful self assessment activity to gauge your carbon footprint can be found at:

December Challenge - Recycle and Re-use

Use your existing Christmas decorations. Make new ones using what you've already got. The challenge is not to buy any new ones this year! Did you know that tinsel can't be recycled so it's better to use it time and time again rather than throw it away and send it to landfill? Is it really better to have a real tree ... or an artificial tree that you use year after year?

Woodburner or open fire - If you have one of these, make sure you have adequate supplies of dry, seasoned wood to burn from February onwards when the new legislation comes into effect and, even better, start before then. Also reduce your use of firelighters to light fires and sweep chimneys regularly to reduce chemicals and particles in the atmosphere.

Den Brook Community Fund

Over the last twelve months, Committee members of the Den Brook Community Fund voted to award grants totalling almost £23,700 to various organisations spread across all five eligible parishes to support them in realising exciting project proposals. In every case, it was recognised that the project would help the organisation to achieve the next stage in the development of their core activities.

This was the Committee's sixth "round" of grant allocations and over the past three years, the fund has been able to allocate funds totalling over **£141,000** to 20 different organisations, providing support towards a wide variety of projects. The projects have all, in one way or another, contributed to the seven community benefit objectives the Committee originally identified, which are-

Improve local physical health and mental well-being.

Promote the care and support of disadvantaged or vulnerable people.

Encourage and support voluntary activity, community spirit and participation through social, sporting and cultural activities.

Improve local employment opportunities.

Produce deliverable benefits to local communities which provide a sustainable legacy over an extended period of time.

Provision of environmental benefits which contribute to energy efficiency initiatives.

Promote equality of opportunity through delivery of neutral, secular, and a-political outcomes.

Grant applications for new projects, which can help make a contribution to some of the objectives above, are invited from voluntary organisations, clubs and societies (based in the five parishes of Bow, North Tawton, South Tawton, Spreyton and Zeal Monachorum) for the next "round" of grant awards. The closing date for this round is 31st Jan 2021.

Avian influenza (bird flu)

Poultry and other captive birds

An <u>Avian Influenza Prevention Zone</u> (PDF, 39.1KB, 6 pages) (AIPZ) has been declared across the whole of England effective from 5 p.m. on 11th November 2020.

All poultry keepers in England (whether they have commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) are required by law to take a range of biosecurity precautions.

If you keep poultry (including gamebirds or pet birds) or other captive birds, you must act now to reduce the risk of disease in your flock by following the relevant biosecurity measures required within the AIPZ. Your stock needs to be fed and watered under cover to prevent contamination from wild birds.

Good biosecurity improves the overall health and productivity of your flock by helping keep out poultry diseases such as avian influenza and limiting the spread of disease in an outbreak.

All bird gatherings within the AIPZ are prohibited therefore the general licence that had permitted bird gatherings has been revoked.

If you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey, you should report them to the Defra helpline (03459 33 55 77)

Public Health England advises that the risk to the public's health is very low. Food Standards Agency (FSA) has said that on the basis of the current scientific evidence, avian influenzas pose a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Avian influenza is unconnected with coronavirus (COVID-19).

Voluntary registration

You can choose to register fewer than 50 birds, or birds you keep as pets. The Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) encourages you to register even if you do not have to by law.

By registering,

- APHA will be able to contact you if there's a disease outbreak (such as bird flu) in your area.
- you'll help prevent the spread of disease and protect the national poultry flock.
