

From The Rectory

As we turn to Remembrance Sunday this month, we remember again all those who have paid the ultimate price for their country down the years for our peace and for our freedom. This year we look back on the two world wars and other conflicts at a time when there is once again war in Europe. Peace, even costly and hard won peace, is a fragile thing. While the war in Ukraine is happening thousands of miles away, its effects are felt right here. Positively, we have had the privilege to welcome refugees from Ukraine to find a home among us while they wait to return to their homes. But we also feel the effect of the war in the rising energy costs and the wider cost of living crisis which is enveloping our nation and world.

In our churches this autumn we have been looking at the story of Nehemiah who led the rebuilding of the city walls of Jerusalem in 445 B.C.. The people of Judea had been conquered by a foreign power, the Babylonian Empire, and taken far away into exile. Now the Persians are in power and the people have the opportunity to return home and to rebuild their ruined city. But it was not all plain sailing. The people under Nehemiah faced similar trials to us today. There was the threat of war from the surrounding nations – enemies in every direction forming an alliance to strike against them. There was a serious cost of living crisis and food was short. There was also fear and divisions growing among the people. It took all of Nehemiah's leadership skills to oversee the rebuilding of the walls while simultaneously organizing the people into a defensive force should war come and at the same time challenging injustice and bringing in social and spiritual reforms.

Nehemiah was surely a great leader. However, the most striking thing reading Nehemiah's account is how he is a person of prayer. Several times he breaks off from his story to pray as he writes. He records two of his own prayers and mentions other prayers too. Indeed, before he begins to initiate this wall building project he spends several months in prayer, over twice as long as it will take for the people to do the work on the walls. Nehemiah, when faced with trials and troubles prays first before acting. That might well be why Nehemiah was able to respond well to all the challenges his people faced, by first bringing these issues to God who he knew as "the great and awesome God, who keeps his covenant of love".

As we face the trails which come our way, whatever they are – personal, national and global, we will obviously need to act, and act wisely, just as Nehemiah did. But Nehemiah would also counsel us to first pray and bring our cares and concern, our trials and troubles before "the great and awesome God, who keeps his covenant of love". The God of the Bible is indeed a God of love, who didn't stav far off, but came himself to join us in the trials of life when he was born as a human being, the baby Jesus. He invites us to bring our cares and worries to him. So, whoever you are - churchgoer or not - why don't you try to pray first today? If you've never prayed before or are unsure of how to do so – why not visit the "try praying" website (trypraying.org) where you can find out more.

For myself, I think the high point of the day has to be the sudden fortissimo shock as, after so much quietness, the coffin entered the Abbey to be greeted with William Croft's exultant 'I am the Resurrection and the Life', the first of the Sentences with which the Anglican funeral rite begins. The Queen's deep Christian faith was a central theme of the day's eulogies, and this moment gave sharp focus to the meaning of the entire day's proceedings.

But there were many extraordinary things happening that day, and in the days leading up to it, and what struck me most strongly was that many, many ordinary people were looking to appease a huge hunger. Most obviously, there was the palpable hunger for meaningful ritual, which is so lacking from so many people's lives. In particular, there was a hunger for mourning – expressed not only by people who had been unable properly to mourn loved ones who died during Covid lockdown, but by many more whose grief for earlier bereavements had been awakened. So many people nowadays are misled by the fashionable view that ritualized mourning is somehow unnecessary, and that our dead should be remembered only in celebration. During those days of queuing to view the lying in state, as well as on the day of the funeral, many admitted that their tears were as much for their own dead as for the Queen.

And during those days of the long queue, another hunger was met. When people said they had found new families, what they were rediscovering was the joy of communion, of face to face encounters rather than virtual relationships filtered through commercially driven algorithms. In a time when so much of our thinking is affected by the poison of 'culture wars', they found they were able to forge relationships with people whose views they knew nothing about, simply because they were human beings on a shared journey.

Yet another hunger was expressed in the constant references to the late Queen's sense of duty, and her commitment to a life of service – both qualities which have come to be regarded as somehow quaintly old-fashioned, but which are fundamental qualities of a Christian life, and should be fundamental in any social contract. The stark contrast was often mentioned between the Queen's understanding of leadership and that of so many of today's leaders. Let us fervently hope that her example may have given rise to reflection, not only among politicians, but among financiers, CEOs, press barons, social media/big tech magnates – everyone, in fact, who exercises power over our lives.

We are told our late Queen enjoyed acting with her sister in pantomimes staged at Windsor Castle when they were teenagers living there during the Second World War. On becoming monarch, such forms of play time were curtailed (at least when she was in the public eye) by the formality of state business and public engagements. We are told also that in private life she had a lively sense of humour and was a talented mimic, but public duties did not offer much opportunity to demonstrate either. Yet it remained with her into later life. Who will forget her arrival "by parachute" to open the London Olympic games? More recently, but in a similar moment which clearly resonated with the very youngest of her subjects, her acting ability was seen as she entertained Paddington Bear to tea at Buckingham Palace, cheerfully disregarding the standard theatrical advice never to appear with children or animals. How reassuring to know that in that ever present handbag there has always been a marmalade sandwich in case of need.

Thank God in our troubled world for a leader with a sense of harmless fun and a fine sense of the moments to show it. Richard Edwards

Master sculptor, Andrew Sinclair MRSS SWAc has been keeping a secret about a sculpture of the Queen he created some time ago, which will soon be displayed in The Royal Box at Ascot Racecourse.

In 2008 Andrew Sinclair MRSS SWAc was asked by Ascot Racecourse to create a bas-relief sculpture of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II, along with those of all the monarchs who have reigned since the racecourse was founded. Following her death, the bas relief will now take its place in the Royal Box.

Andrew was commissioned to create a series of bas-relief plaque portraits for the Royal Box at Ascot Racecourse. The course has always had a close association with the royal family, being only six miles from Windsor Castle, and the commission was to create portraits of all the monarchs who have reigned since the racecourse was founded in 1711 by Queen Anne.

Andrew researched each monarch extensively and worked closely with both historians and the Royal Mint to ensure detailed likenesses. He worked directly from the original historic drawings of the coins from each monarch's reign. The bas-relief plaques are now positioned along the concourse of the Royal Box at the racecourse. Andrew was also commissioned to create the coat of arms that adorns both the inside, and famously, the outside of the Royal Box. Andrew explains, *"It was an honour and a privilege to work on a project as esteemed as this. I love history, so having the opportunity to work closely with Royal Mint to replicate the original coins was brilliant."*

The Queen personally chose her favourite profile image from the original Royal Mint drawings. Royal protocol dictated that her bas-relief image was not allowed to be revealed to the public until her reign ended. It will be an honour to see the late HM Queen Elizabeth II's portrait in its rightful place in due course.

Clock Tower Roof Collapse

A structural survey has been carried out and we are pleased that parts of the roof can be saved, and the cause of the partial collapse is decay on a previous repair. We are currently awaiting approval from West Devon Conservation Officer to dismantle the roof because the tower is Grade II Listed. Then the safety fencing will be removed so the seating can be accessed. For safety reasons, the electrics for the roof lighting have been Disconnected. Unfortunately the clock face lights are on the same wire loop and have also had to be disconnected. The Conservation Officers will make a separate decision on whether the Council will need to submit a Listed Building Application to rebuild the roof as it is not considered a minor or routine repair.

North Tawton Afternoon W.I.

Ramblings of a North Tawton W.I. Member

Were you a Thunderbirds fan? I was. I loved it. My brother and I would watch it avidly, with me hanging on Virgil's every word. In fact, I had a bit of a crush on Virgil. Bit strange when you think that he was actually a puppet. We would tune in regularly to follow the International Rescue team saving people from all kinds of situations. Virgil piloted Thunderbird 2 which was a heavy transport aircraft carrier with a detachable pod – Virgil always got the really difficult missions – I used to worry about Virgil. My brother collected the Corgi/Dinky models including Lady Penelope's pink car, FAB 1, which had a missile launcher behind the radiator grill. If you opened the grill and pushed the car down you could fire the rocket – at your brother. The theme tune from Thunderbirds was brilliant. Instantly recognisable. I could hum it if you want me to.

'Saving lives in wild and remote places' - could almost be a tag line from Thunderbirds, but not today this was for real. Harry Price was here to tell us about the North Dartmoor Search and Rescue Team and there was nothing fictional about Harry's talk. Harry explained that the Dartmoor Rescue Group consists of four teams - Tavistock, Ashburton, Okehampton [also known as North Dartmoor] - and Plymouth, which cover the 365 square miles of Dartmoor and beyond. The teams often work together to provide a search and rescue service for Dartmoor, the rest of Devon and Cornwall and could also be called upon to help with operations on Exmoor. Their members are all volunteers who undergo professional training in searching, navigation, search dog handling, swift water rescues and casualty care, where they learn to manage sophisticated medical equipment requiring skills that are on a similar specification to paramedic level. Trainees will spend 18-24 months learning the basic skill set and may also be taught off road driving and radio skills. Harry went on to explain the importance of the Supporters Group. Fundraising is just part of their remit – applying for grants and awards, talking to the public at events and country shows and being a 'pretend' casualty for training exercises are all vital ways of supporting the team. Slides of the 'Dog Section' drew loud 'aahhhs'. Jack and Angus are both qualified search dogs, Tio and Pipit are trainees – and it was very clear from the photos that they love what they do. Fancy being a 'Dogs Body'? Then why not volunteer to 'hide' on Dartmoor and wait to be found by a search dog. Harry had us all laughing with the wonderful story of a team member [now retired] who accidentally rolled their Land Rover and the message over the radio was 'I've turned the Land Rover over over'. Brilliant. Harry's passion and dedication to the team was simply inspirational.

I've been stopped in the street. Not for directions. Not even if I want help to cross the road. Oh no. People have asked me 'how much rain did we have last night?' and 'what was the temperature at 3 a.m.?' – Husband's new toy is becoming an obsession. If I look over the top of my computer I can see the weather base station staring back at me. The best part? The 'multisensor' bit on a pole in the garden came in very useful to support our sunflowers. Bet that doesn't happen at the Met Office.

The amount available this time is lower than before – the balances in the fund reflecting significant investments of over $\pounds 50,000$ in local community projects over the last twelve months as well as a further $\pounds 12,200.00$ the fund has agreed to provide for "pump-priming" two other significant projects where "match-funding" initiatives are already underway.

Connecting Devon & Somerset, a local government partnership, are again offering vouchers to cover the cost of improving your mobile phone signal indoors so that you can use a mobile phone signal as a source of home broadband if you need to. You may have received a flier through your letterbox.

If you do not appear to be in line for fibre roll-out either by Airband or Openreach and you have been told by Airband that you cannot receive microwave broadband because your premises cannot "see" their aerial, then you might consider using a mobile phone signal to receive broadband. Several parishioners already do this and report a perfectly acceptable service.

Connecting Devon & Somerset will pay for the installation which consists of an aerial on top of your house and a router inside to give wifi broadband.

<u>You will be required to take out a new SIM data only package which can be obtained from £20 per month.</u> This will be the SIM card that sits inside the router and will need to be paid for on a monthly contract to give you broadband by wifi inside your house. This should be the only cost associated with this broadband solution. The engineer who installs your system will have spare SIM cards on the "3" network available at a good contract price of £20 per month. If your area is not covered by the "3" network, then you will be advised about whether Vodaphone or EE will work for you. The engineer will be able to explain all the possible options when the survey and installation is done.

This solution may work for some who otherwise cannot receive fast reliable broadband. Go to <u>www.devoncomms.co.uk/voucher</u> where you can start the process. You can call them on 01803 501711 This is a genuine government sponsored offer which may be a suitable option for those of you who are outside the fibre area and cannot get Airband microwave access. YOU MUST APPLY SOON, they say vouchers are available until November but no final date has been set. If you have any questions you are likely to find Connecting Devon and Somerset will have the answers but if you wish to speak to someone locally please get in touch with Cllr. Seasonal Suggestion – November


Several of us are officially 'compost-obsessed' and this is the right time of year to get things sorted. Making compost at home is an eco-friendly way of using kitchen and plant waste to create what many gardeners refer to as 'black gold'. It can aid your soil by helping drainage on clay soils as well as helping sandy soils retain more moisture. It contains nutrients for plant growth and encourages worm activity – all of which is good for your garden. Added to this, the wider environmental benefits of reducing landfill and the cost of transporting 'waste' away from your property are significant. We've included items here before about composting cardboard. Fallen leaves can also be added to 'green waste' (kitchen vegetable scraps, mown grass and garden prunings etc.) to produce (in time and after the contents have reached 70C) a crumbly brown material that you can dig into your soil or put on the top to keep weeds down and moisture in during the hot Summers we've been having. *Note: Best to avoid meat scraps or animal fats as that will almost certainly attract rats!*

At this time of year you can work out the rotation of cropping in your vegetable patch to see where the compost will be most effective – use the internet to find out which areas of your garden need most compost added and the best sequence for planting crops year by year.

If you don't have space for a compost bin then why not research having a 'wormery'? All kinds of organic waste can be turned into a useful liquid feed for plants as well as what the worms have digested. Both can be used to enrich your soil. You can use a wormery purely for dog waste but, clearly, you wouldn't want to use the results of the process on your vegetable patch – fine, though, on herbaceous borders. Interestingly, the worms in a wormery are not earthworms, they are thin red worms that process decaying organic matter. They usually just appear but you can buy them on-line if you can't wait for them to find their way to your bin!

A real bonus to making your own compost is not using peat-based composts which are being phased out and not using the peat-free compost alternatives. Several keen gardeners in the Sampford Courtenay Parish have been asked how they're getting on with the peat-free type and there is a very mixed response. Many praised the results they got with the sheep's wool and bracken compost that we bought in bulk for Parishioners a couple of years ago. Nationally, professional gardeners are saying the same thing – it all depends what your peat-free compost is made from. Some types work well, some dry out too quickly and some just don't get things growing. The results from our annual 'Potato in a bucket' competition would suggest that home produced compost wins hands down every time – just ask Barbara!





News From North Tawton Community Primary School



It seems a long time ago now, but back in June we had an Ofsted Inspection!

Ofsted is the Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills. Their role is to inspect services providing education and skills for learners of all ages and regulate services that care for children and young people.

A school can expect to have an inspection every four years, however our school had not had an inspection since 2014, so we were well and truly due a visit.

We received 'the call' on Wednesday 22nd June from the Ofsted office where I was informed that we would have a two-day inspection led by Her Majesty's Inspector, Sue Costello. This call was closely followed by a detailed phone conversation with our inspector where she asked me lots of questions about our school context, systems, progress, and priorities. She and I agreed the evidence she would gather based upon our conversation.

Ofsted Inspectors evaluate schools against the following key judgements:

- quality of education
- behaviour and attitudes
- personal development
- leadership and management

As you would expect, all inspectors look in detail at safeguarding procedures, legal policies, parents' views and pupil and staff wellbeing. In our conversation regarding curriculum, we agreed she would conduct a 'deep dive' into Early Reading, including our Read Write Inc phonics programme, Maths and History.

As you can imagine the whole staff team were anxious to do well. As with any test or assessment, you can be well prepared, but there are often butterflies on the day!

Over the two days, our inspector met with pupils, staff, curriculum leaders, our SENDCO, Trust leaders, Trustees and Governors. She observed lessons and playtimes, scrutinised pupil's work, analysed Parent View and our policies.

On the afternoon of the second day, she fed back her verbal report to me and the Trust leaders. I was really pleased with her findings as they matched our own, but I then had to wait until the report was published to share this with anyone.

It was an exhausting, but robust and fair process. Because of the summer holiday, it was not until September that the report was published and I was able to share with staff, pupils and parents.

Schools are graded as either outstanding, good, requires improvement, or inadequate. I am delighted to say that we remain a 'good' school.

I have read many Ofsted reports and can honestly say ours is a very good good!

The first line fills me with joy. 'Pupils love their school and are proud of it.'

As a staff team, we are delighted that the inspector's findings matched our own assessment of the school. We have a wonderful school of pupils who are 'keen and enthusiastic learners' and are 'well mannered and polite.' The staff team have worked hard to ensure safeguarding and provision for SEND are of a high standard and that all children are being well cared for. I am particularly pleased that the Inspector saw the work we have done across the school to promote diversity and that children are well prepared for life in modern Britain.

Ofsted inspectors are required to report findings so they can be used to improve the overall quality of education and training. We were aware that the new curriculum in KS1 needed more rigour and higher expectations, and we were able to talk about our plans to address this. 


