

From The Rectory

In the last few weeks, we have had some trees pruned in the Rectory garden. It is amazing to see the tree surgeons at work shaping and pruning the trees – leaving a wonderfully neat hedge behind where before there was what looked like a small forest. What would be impossible for me to do in a lifetime, is achieved in a matter of hours by people with the skills and the right tools.

Tree surgery is maybe one of the most extreme forms of 'pruning'. Maybe near the other end is the pruning of a vine. Not only does a vine need a full prune in the winter, it also needs gentle daily pruning during the growing season. Nipping here and there to make sure that no extra branches, grapes and leaves are grown, but all the energy goes into growing the right number of big juicy grapes. I am no gardener but in the past when we lived in a house with a vine in the garden we used to get 40kg of grapes from one well-tended vine. The work is very much worthwhile because vines are full of life, vigour and growth and can be extremely fruitful. Jesus uses this picture of a vine being pruned as a picture of the Christian life:

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener... every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful. ... I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." (John 15:1, 5)

Jesus is like a vine, full of life and vigour – life that is constantly being shared with the branches, his followers, in great abundance. Sustenance which causes us as the branches to grow and bear much good fruit. Fruit of loving actions, fruit of a transformed character, fruit of faith in God. Jesus claims that true life and fruitfulness is found when we remain connected into him. Jesus hints at several ways we remain connected into him – through reading the Bible, through prayer, through loving one another, through obeying his teaching. And these are all ways in which we grow a

personal relationship with him, putting our trust in him. Jesus is the vine, and his followers are the branches, but there is another person in this picture – the gardener, the Father, God. He is the one who prunes those who remain in Jesus, the vine. Pruning a vine looks from first glance not great for the vine – it is losing branches, leaves and grapes which it has put effort into producing. But the reality is that it is the loving and caring thing to do. If you don't prune a vine it tends to shoot off everywhere in all directions and produce tiny little grapes. Pruning allows the vine to reach its full potential.

And so that in the end Jesus' followers are more fruitful and more loving people, Jesus tells us God is at work to help prune away the bits of our lives that stop us being fruitful – bad habits, selfishness, wrongdoing. Jesus here promises for those who remain in him – who invest in getting to know him – God himself will be at work day-by-day to help them grow into the person he created them to be.

Jesus sums up that picture of what we can become in the Gardener God's hands in one word – love. Not just any love but he says:

Love each other as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. (John 15:12-13)

Love means many things to many people, but to Jesus it means love that gives everything. Love that is happy even to lay down its life for others. That is a powerful love that when really lived out can change lives and communities. But it is not an easy thing – far from it. That's why Jesus starts with the picture of the vine – the place to find the love to love others in this extraordinary way is in him. Jesus who did indeed, out of love, lay down his life for his friends as we will celebrate in a few weeks at Easter.

Clock Tower Roof

The Council has considered quotes to rebuild the collapsed roof which were in the region of £17,000. The council awaits the results of a full building survey and a look at funding options. We have also requested DCC to investigate the possibility of subsidence as the Clock is on the highway. If you have any strong views on whether the canopy should be rebuilt, please come to the Annual Town Meeting or write to one of our Councillors or the Town Clerk.

Annual Town Meeting – Thursday 16th March 7 p.m., Town Hall

The annual town meeting is an opportunity for local electors to speak with the Town Councillors. Please come along and let Councillors know your opinion on matters affecting the Town. Proposed agenda items (subject to change) are - Clock Tower canopy rebuild and associated costs, Electric Vehicle Charging, WDBC changes to planning application requirements, North Tawton Cemetery Extension, future of town centre public toilets, redesigning the traffic flow of The Square. The agenda will be published 14 days prior to the meeting. For more information, please contact the Town Clerk.

2023/24 Budget and precept

The Council has set its budget as £174,277. This is a decrease of £44,638 on 2022/23. We have requested a precept demand of £144,971. The band D parish rate will be £203.24, which is a <u>5.9% increase</u> on 2022/23 amounting to an increase of £11.32 per year, (94p per month/22p per week on a band D property). Full details can be obtained from the Town Clerk or on the Council website under Agendas 2023 – Full Council agenda documents – RFO budget report.

Electric Vehicle charging

The council has agreed to ask DCC for permission to approach a private company to install an on-street EV charging point outside the Barbers in the Square. The Council is also obtaining feasibility studies to redesign the Town Car park to accommodate 2 EV charge points without loss of current parking availability. The Council is only seeking quotes from companies which will cover all installation and maintenance costs for an EV charge point and therefore at no cost to the taxpayers.

Do you run an electric vehicle (EV) and charge it at home? If so, would you be willing to share your charge point with visitors to the Town and members of our community who don't have access to off-road parking to be able to charge an EV at home? There are around 200 households in North Tawton which would not be able to charge an EV at their home. The Town Council is encouraging local businesses to host a public EV charge point. Schemes match 'hosts' with EV drivers, usually through a mobile phone app.. Both parties agree a date, time and the price the driver will pay you. This is typically $\pounds 2 - \pounds 3$ per hour with a minimum charge of $\pounds 5$, encouraging EV use and assuring visitors that they would be able to charge their EV in North Tawton. Pedestrianised bridge over the river Taw

The invaluable work undertaken by Mrs. Knott & Mrs. Hughes to investigate and pursue the possibility of constructing a pedestrian bridge over the river Taw can no longer be accomplished at the preferred location due to the additional works to North Tawton's flood defences at the bottom of Fore Street recently completed by the Environment Agency. The discovery of existing pipework in this area, plus the newly built 'header wall' unfortunately negate the possibility of progressing the proposed footbridge alongside the existing bridge over the river Taw. The Council will continue to pursue other options.

Community Land Trust (CLT) Public Meeting Thursday 23rd March, 7pm Town Hall

MiddleMarch (support for community led housing) will be providing a presentation and Q&A to discuss the benefits of forming a community land trust for North Tawton to provide affordable housing and/or other community assets. This is not a Town Council initiative and will require volunteers from the Parish to form a steering group and meet with MiddleMarch following the public meeting.

Council Elections 4th May

Elections will take place to elect 12 North Tawton Town Councillors. The election process commences on 23rd March and the closing date for nominations is 4th April. The Town Council is non-political, but candidates can stand on behalf of a registered political party providing they meet the requirements to do so. The Town clerk will be hosting an information evening followed by a question and answers session for any interested candidates 6.00 to 6.45 p.m. on Thursday 16th March in the Town Council office. North Tawton Afternoon W.I.

Ramblings of a North Tawton W.I. Member

"Well who is going to step into Sue's shoes?" was the question at the last committee meeting following the news that our "Roundabout" reporter was out of action for a while. The silence said it all. "If nobody fancies doing it, then I guess I can do something" came a voice in the room. Only minutes later did I realise the voice was mine!

Regular readers of our W.I. page will know that the life of a member of North Tawton W.I. is never dull and pretty much every month there is something happening other than the meetings themselves. The W.I. was set up initially to inform and educate (a bit like the BBC) and as such provide opportunities for women of the time they otherwise wouldn't have had. In 1915, few women worked outside the home and didn't have the vote and the W.I. was seen as being ground-breaking and innovative in promoting women's issues. Our W.I. still tries to keep the original aims alive but if I am being honest, it's mostly about meeting friends, making new friends, eating and drinking and having fun. Mind you, after most meetings I come home having learned something and last month's meeting was no exception. In February we discussed and voted for a resolution that the W.I. will adopt nationally and campaign for in the coming years. There were four topics discussed ranging from tackling online gambling to campaigning for better working conditions for women tea workers across the globe. In the end our W.I. voted by a small majority for the campaign entitled " save our water – every drop matters". All serious stuff you might think but when you have a mouth full of cake and a cup of tea to slurp before seeing if you have won the raffle, nothing feels too onerous. What's more, I learned that the average household uses over 100 litres of water a day meaning if I was to swap my afternoon tea for a gin and tonic, I could have fun and save water at the same time!

On the last Saturday in January, our quiz team was being put through its paces in the first round of the W.I. county quiz. At the halfway point we were lagging but fuelled by tea and cake we romped home to win by a very slim margin. Clearly, the input of a fairy cake can do wonders for the brain and explains why so many women in the W.I. are so talented and clever- it's cake power! The county final is in March and so the quiz team has been put on a strict training regime of Fondant Fancies and Chocolate Muffins in preparation.

February is North Tawton W.I.'s 94th birthday. Founded in 1929, this was the same year the government raised the legal age for marriage to 16 and the first Tesco was opened in Edgware . To celebrate our birthday but also another excuse to get together, our group met for a birthday lunch at the Waie Inn where a good time was enjoyed by all. Being 94 doesn't seem to have dampened our ability to enjoy ourselves and I can report that your regular Roundabout reporter is making good progress in the hope that normal service can be resumed next month.

Speaking of which, we have De Bora coming from Exeter to talk to us about something that is close to most women's hearts. For those of you in the know what I am talking about is brassieres!

We heard that she will be looking for volunteers to model her bras. So far no one has stepped forward and this time I am keeping my mouth tightly closed.

The Open Mic has been set up by North Tawton residents Wez Cutler and Cathy Page, who came t ogether with a shared vision of seeing a regular event in the town.





Have you tried yoga before and thought oh that's not for me?


Or, I'm not bendy enough? Or I'm too old...stop right there.....

This month's Art Box is written by North Tawton artist, Gemma Quickenden

In my early 30's I put myself through a traditional art training in Italy. The first two years are about training the eye to see and the hand to comply. It's methodical, the same as how a musician develops their ear and fingers or a cook develops their taste. This is very different to UK art universities where I believe you are taught to capture ideas, feelings and be impulsive. There is definitely place for both schools of thought in this world. I believe that really looking, over time, enables us to question and understand. It's very easy to 'see' a bird - our brain classifies it as bird and forgets - yet Darwin changed our theory of evolution by looking. Maybe this is more important today as phones provide click bait, pop songs are designed to have us hooked in the first 10 seconds and attention spans are shortening. Portrait painting from life takes a great amount of time from the sitter. The painter will however notice changes throughout the sitting, the way the light hits, if they are tired, happy, you can see the colour fill or drain out the skin, the posture change and you get to know the character. Oil paint allows you to paint multiple translucent versions of your sitter's personality to create depth. Rembrandt was the master of this. Sargent wanted his paintings to look fresh, but still spent the same duration painting, then each day scraped off the paint until he captured the sum of all of those sittings. Humanity is timeless. For the viewer, artwork hung on the wall changes, we notice new subtleties, it talks to us over time as we age and have different experiences under our belt.

475th Anniversary of Prayer Book Rebellion – June 2024

David Botting (see page 15) explained that he has recently obtained a programme, cast list and some photos of the 450th Prayer Book Rebellion Celebration which took place in the village in 1999. As next year (May 2024) will be the 475th Anniversary he asked for the support of SCPC for a public meeting to look into viability of a "Tudor Fete" or other events to celebrate this historic occasion. Request to list Church Rooms as a Community Asset.

Following the deferment of this Item from the January SCPC meeting, Cllr. Wilson has met with Rev. D. Spence and also contacted WDBC. Having discussed the parishioner's request for the Parish Council to register the property, the PCC position is that whilst there are no plans to change the current arrangements for use and maintenance of the building, should any future decision be made to realise the capital of this asset, registration could offer the community reassurance that at least there would be an opportunity for action to take place to maintain and preserve the social, cultural and historic value of the property for the benefit of the community.

At the PCC meeting held on 11th January Rev Spence raised the registration of the rooms and this was discussed. There are likely to be further discussions regarding potential uses for the Rooms once a full survey has taken place. It was agreed with Rev. Spence that a successful registration of the asset, could have potential benefits when applying for any grants in the future as it shows community interest and engagement.

It was proposed that the application be prepared and submitted. Proposal - Cllr. Wilson Seconded Cllr Carpenter Votes in favour – Cllr. Wilson, Cllr. Carpenter, Cllr. Morrissey, Cllr. Tucker, Cllr. Collins Object – Cllr. Coleman Abstain – Cllr. Friend.

Dartmoor Line – Sampford Courtenay Station

Cllr. Wilson reported that the fantastic news regarding the successful Levelling Up application came after the last OkeRail meeting. However, the OkeRail Forum were positive in giving support to use their influence and experience to maintain a co-ordinated effort on developing other lines in the area eg Bude, Bideford – Barnstaple; Plymouth – Bere Alston and Plymouth to Tavistock. Cllr. Morrissey asked if Cllr. Wilson could suggest at the next OkeRail meeting that Sampford Courtenay Station be considered as a contingency/stand by station for Okehampton Station.

Community Speed Watch - Emily would like to step down as co-ordinator for Sampford Courtenay Speed Watch group – if you would like to consider taking up this position please contact the Clerk.

SCENSUS - Parish Spring Clean and Village Green working party to be arranged in the later this month. Please look out for

details of how you can help.

Request from PCC for a contribution towards £1100 cost of making safe the Lime Tree in the Church yard. Cllr. Wilson proposed a contribution of £250 be made towards this expenditure, which was supported unanimously.

News From North Tawton Community Primary School



Industrial Action

As you may well be aware, members of the National Education Union (NEU) voted to take industrial action, and as the ballot surpassed the benchmarks required, the union called for members to take strike action. The first of those days was Wednesday 1st February. North Tawton Primary school found itself in the position of having to close to pupils. The parents and families have been overwhelmingly supportive, however many had questions so I thought I would take this opportunity to explain to the whole community why the action was taken, and what is likely to happen next.

Why was North Tawton closed while other schools were either open, or partially open?

The reason for this is that education staff across the country belong to one of several unions, or none at all. While all unions have been asking for fairer funding, only one union voted for industrial action, the National Education Union (NEU) All of our teaching staff, including myself, are in the NEU and chose to strike, therefore there would not have been be any teachers or safeguarding leads on site which of course would not be viable.

So why are teachers on strike?

As we are all acutely aware, the cost of inflation is ever rising, however pay for staff who work in education has not risen to match this. Where pay rises have been given, they have been allocated from school's individual existing budgets therefore money has been taken from pots intended for other areas of school expenditure, such as trips, events and resources in order to make financial cuts.

While we have retained staff at North Tawton, the reality is that high numbers of teachers, and teaching assistants are leaving the profession across the UK. Staff can earn far more, work less hours and have less accountability in many other industries. This also impacts on recruitment.

Why such short notice?

Union members do not have to give any notice of their intentions to strike. As ours did, I was able to let parents know in advance, for which I am grateful.

What did you do on your day off?

Some staff, including myself, went to the rally in Exeter and met up with staff and parents from other Trust schools. Some had a day of doing life admin. as we have much less time for this in a week than we would wish, and some had children to look after as the school was shut.

Do you feel guilty?

I sincerely regret the inconvenience to parents and carers and are very mindful of the disruption to routine and to children's education. However, like my colleagues, I feel that issues in the state education system impacting on pay are also impacting, perhaps with greater effect, on the education and wellbeing of the pupils we care for. Services to support our most vulnerable students have been cut, and I have been shocked to see how less well funded schools in rural areas like Devon are than schools I have worked in previously in London.

I want you to know that this strike action is taken reluctantly but with clear intent. I hope that this action will bring the attention of the government and of the public to bear on the issues of funding in general which are making it more difficult for teachers to teach and children to learn. Teachers do not get paid if on strike. Taking a pay cut to protest for a pay rise is an expensive gamble.

What next?

Friends of North Tawton School (FONTS) have always raised money to subsidise visitors and trips, events and resources to enhance learning. We are now relying on fundraising and applying for grants more than ever before. The Y6 trip to France is fully funded as a group of Trust staff applied for a grant through the Turing Scheme. We are looking at more ways to create income and reduce costs.

I would love to employ more staff to work with our pupils but we are not in a position to do this at present. Therefore, we are relying on volunteers to support essential activities such as reading to an adult regularly.

It looks like further strikes in March will be going ahead, so school will again be closed.

I hope you all know that our staff care deeply for the education of our pupils, and this really is a last resort. I hope the government and unions will come to a sensible decision which will enable us all to get back to teaching our pupils which we are all passionate about.


