# HOW TO MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR RECYCLING - DILYS LORD WDBC





# Where Does my Recycling and Waste Go?

Recycling in West Devon is collected using the kerbside sort method. This means that the recycling is sorted into different compartments of the collection vehicle depending on the material. This method helps us maintain a good quality of recyclables which makes them easier to recycle.

When the collection vehicles are full they tip the recycling at Hayedown depot, near Tavistock. From there the recyclables are bulked by type and sent to be recycled. The metals and plastics are sent to Exeter City Council's Materials Reclamation Facility for further sorting before being sent for recycling.

Plastics and cans are sorted at Exeter City Council's Materials Reclamation Facility before being transferred to the final re-processor.

#### **Food and Garden Waste**

The contents of the food caddies is tipped by the collection vehicles at Hayedown depot, near Tavistock. Here it is bulked before being delivered to **Andigestion's Anaerobic Digestion Facility in Holsworthy**. The material is broken down in a series of sealed, oxygen free tanks to produce methane, a gas used to generate electricity and digestate, a nutrient rich fertiliser used by local farmers.

Garden waste collected from subscribing households is tipped directly at **Artiscombe Farm, near Tavistock.** Here the garden waste is composted in large heaps which are turned every few weeks to improve breakdown of the waste. The resulting compost is used by local farmers.

You do not have to use bio-degradable bags for your food waste - any bag will do.


#### **Residual Waste**

The black sacks are tipped by the collection vehicles at Crowndale Transfer Station where it is bulked before being delivered to MVV's Energy from Waste (EfW) and Combined Heat & Power (CHP) facility in Plymouth. The waste is used as a fuel to heat water into superpower steam which turns a turbine to create electricity

You do not have to use black bags - any bag will do.

If there is enough interest, SCPC could arrange a visit to the Education Centre at the Energy from Waste plant in Plymouth.

# **Drowning in Plastic**

Every minute a "rubbish truck load" of plastic goes into our oceans. It doesn't decompose but stays in our oceans.



- 78% of this originates from land sources (i.e. litter).
- Plastic entering the environment creates a hazard for wildlife who can digest or get caught up in it.








## **Bulky Waste**

- Bulky furniture can be disposed of free of charge at recycling centres.
- If it is reusable, **Refurnish Devon** can arrange a FREE collection. These items are tested, repaired and sold at an affordable price to local people.
- If items are not fit for reuse the Council can provide a bulky household waste collection.



If you are buying large electrical items, check with the store to see if they can take your old one away at the same time. You may even be able to arrange a part-exchange.

- large dog food paper bags which have a water resistant lining - use instead of black bags
- old style light bulbs recycling centre
- small fluorescent light bulbs recycling centre
- plastic bags save up and take back to your supermarket
- crisp packets as above
- old shoes / wellingtons /footwear charity shops if good
- old cushions/pillows animal shelters
- Christmas/birthday/greetings cards recycling bins as long as there is no glitter.
- what type of textiles are recycled and which are not.- all textiles can be recycled.
- If you can put all your cereal packets together, and paper in a bag it helps the recyclers.
- are there any open day / visits to see how the recycling is treated - If enough interest SCPC will arrange a visit to Plymouth - Energy from Waste depot.

### SCPC UPDATE - Chair MICHELE WILSON



#### Cllr Wilson summarised the progress made on the Parish Priorities:-

- Public Toilets have been refurbished with new roof, windows and doors. Internal decoration to be arranged.
- Defibrillator has been installed in the old telephone kiosk in the square and one training session has taken place another one will be arranged for next year.
- SCEnSus continues to give suggestions on how we as individuals and a community, can make small changes to help the environment. New members would be welcome.
- Sampford Courtenay Station has been adopted by SCPC to keep clean and tidy, and lobbying through OkeRail Forum and with NWR for future re-opening of the station.
- Safer Roads we now have a volunteer group of Speed Watchers who are monitoring speeds at various approved spots in the parish. We are also liaising with British Horse Society for ideas to slow traffic.
- Broadband & Mobile Signal a lot of work has been done on this over the past months, with many properties now fully connected to fibre. If you are still in a "black spot" please let us know so we can see if we can help.
- Support for the Village Hall Cllr Wilson was instrumental in obtaining the Lottery Grant for Roof-Us, plus obtaining further grants to enable the refurbishment of the Hall toilets.

## DCC UPDATE - CLLR JAMES MCINNES



- DCC budget is £600 million from that £300 million goes to Adult Social Services, £190 million goes to Children Services - which leaves just £110 million to cover all the rest eg roads etc.
- Currently DCC has a £40 million hole, of which they have managed to find £20 with savings etc - but with current national climate producing a balanced budget is going to be difficult.
- The health and care bill, which is expected to become the Health and Care Act (2022), is set to abolish clinical commissioning groups (CCGs) and establish statutory integrated care systems (ICSs). An ICS (integrated care system) is a new partnership of organisations that provide healthcare to a larger area and population (than CCGs). Cllr James this will enable DCC and the local ICS to work together more effectively. He also asked if you have any questions re local Health care, he is happy for you to email him.
- DCC Libraries are working to provide "Warm Places" this winter.
- Community Voluntary Sector will be relied on more in the coming months.
- It is unlikely that DCC will be able to cut their portion of Council Tax in the coming year, but will have to increase to the maximum they are allowed (2.9%) in order to maintain a balanced budget.

## WDBC UPDATE - CLLR BARRY RATCLIFFE



- Unlike DCC, it is encouraging that WDBC should end the financial year
- The changes to the Refuse Collection contract should result in a better service and better value for money.
- 3 Local developments for social housing, for homeless and displaced persons have been approved in Tavistock, Brentor and Okehampton.
- WDBC have some funds available to help those in Fuel Poverty and with their Council Tax see details here <a href="https://www.westdevon.gov.uk/article/8522/Support-Directory">https://www.westdevon.gov.uk/article/8522/Support-Directory</a>
- WDBC are also giving more support to the local Citizen's Advice Bureau and SCPC could possibly organise a meeting with CAB here to provide help for parishioners.

## **COUNCIL ELECTIONS - MAY 2023**



Town and Parish Council elections on the 04 May 2023, when all councillors will retire and those wishing to re-stand will be required to submit a nomination paper. Nomination papers will also be available for new parishioners wishing to join SCPC.

# VILLAGE HALL UPDATE - CHAIR ROGER THOMPSON



- It has been an exhilarating few months with work on the roof etc
- Thank you to many parishioners for the major fund raising that was required.
- It has demonstrated a strong community illustrated so well in the video of Community events that was submitted with the Lottery Application.
- The work on the roof commenced on 3<sup>rd</sup> Oct and is due to finish by 10<sup>th</sup> Dec.
- The Toilets are currently being refurbished and should be finished in a couple of weeks.
- Fund raising before the Lottery had raised £40 £50,000.
- Lottery Grant of £150,000 but the cost of the roof has been quoted at £170,000
- Grants of £8,500 have been obtained for the Toilet refurbishment but they will cost £9,000.
- Hence all the money raised has been allocated to ongoing projects and the Village Hall Trustees will have to continue to raise money to keep the hall viable and build up a modest reserve.
- More events like the recent Curry Evening, at which 60 people attended resulting in £740 profit, will be arranged for the future.

#### FLOWER & VEG SHOW 2023


- THOUGHTS & SUGGESTIONS MADE SO FAR!


