

From The Rectory

What will you be up to on the 14th February this year? Will you be out on a date with a boyfriend, girlfriend or spouse? Or will you be joining us for our Ash Wednesday service? Two very different events have fallen on the same day this year. One a celebration of love and romance – the other a sombre lament for the wrong we have done. Just don't get them mixed up - Iam not sure your beloved would thank you taking them on a date to an Ash Wednesday service! Ash Wednesday marks the start of the time of Lent, leading up to the central festivals of the Christian year - Good Friday and Easter Sunday. The traditional Lent fast emphasised giving up rich and fancy foods. Exactly what constitutes a "luxurious" food is now somewhat different; few of us think of eggs, milk, and sugar as luxuries today. In the past these were the kinds of foods given up in Lent. That's where Pancake Day comes from: the pancakes were a way of finishing up the eggs, milk and sugar, before the Lent fast started on Ash Wednesday. But I guess people of the past would recognise the principle of us giving up chocolate, alcohol or coffee for Lent. Giving up food for Lent is only part of the full picture. The practice of Lent also includes prayer and penance a sober reflection on our lives, how we have acted and spoken; and seeking God for forgiveness and help for the future. So, on Ash Wednesday there is the tradition of receiving an 'imposition of ash' on the forehead to mark our attitude of repentance and sorrow. As I reflected on this clash of 'festivals', I began to

realise that there is a link as well. One of the pictures God uses of the relationship between himself and the church is that of the intimacy of marriage, for example Paul writes this:

Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church...

But then he goes on to link this to Jesus Christ's death on Good Friday:

Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless.

The Lent fast and Ash Wednesday service are designed to help us to reflect on our moral stains and unholiness and prepares us for the gift of God's forgiveness which comes through Jesus' "giving himself up" to death that first Good Friday. The ultimate act of love and sacrifice, and the model for our love. A cleansing to make us holy so we can know loving intimacy with a Holy God. Why not discover more about Jesus and the loving intimacy he offers with God this Lent through joining us for our Alpha course – details are below.





By-Election

Following the resignation of Cllr. Bath, sufficient requests have been received by WDBC requesting a by-election. Poll date 8th February 2024. Nominations to WDBC closed on 12th January 2024. For further information please contact WDBC Elections office or Town Clerk.

Town Crier

The Town Council will be holding a competition to select a new town crier. Further details to follow.

Clock Tower

Work is underway in the contractor's workshop to slice and repair the canopy woodwork in accordance with Listed Building Control requirements. Once the weather improves, the work to the masonry will resume prior to the canopy being erected.

Lych Gate

North Tawton Town Council is disappointed that the Lych Gate has been Listed despite the council's objection. The Council resolved on 7th November 2023 "to respond that we do not believe the Lych Gate to be architecturally important, it is in the conservation area therefore the conservation officer would have to be involved in approving works and following our recent experience with the Clock tower, works to listed buildings will inherently be a higher cost to the taxpayers to maintain, therefore the Town Council do not support the listing of the Lych Gate, all in favour" The Church of England website clearly states that grants are not available for Lych Gate commenced prior to it becoming Listed and is fully funded by public donation and not by the taxpayers. North Tawton Town Council's experience with the clock tower is that consultation with Listed Building Planning Officers to obtain permissions for works in accordance with instructions from Listed Building Control tend to be refused. The specialist repair instructed by Listed Building Control inevitably incurs a higher charge rate. The Town Council is of the belief that listing of the Lych Gate would result in similar problems and the only result would be delays and increased cost to taxpayers.

Public Meeting – Parking provision around the Town

The Town Council called a public meeting in the Town Hall on Thursday 25th January 2024, 7 pm, to advise and discuss with residents the work undertaken over many years to source the provision of additional public parking around the town, and the reasons why this has not been possible to date. February's "Roundabout" went to press before that meeting so results are not yet available.

2024/25 Budget

The Finance Committee will be presenting their recommended budget to the full Council on 6th February for a final decision. The finance committee met on 22nd January 2024 to finalise their recommendations.

Warm Space and Community Fridge/Larder/Freezer

Thanks to grant funding from WDBC, the Town Council can continue to fund the warm space initiatives and Jens Café and Merry Go Round. The Community fridge has been expanded to include a freezer. Food items donated by residents are now available from the community fridge. This initiative is to help residents who are struggling to keep warm and need a warm space and a cuppa, to get a cheap hot meal, or to help themselves to donated food items.

Council Meeting.

Our next council meetings will be Tuesday 6th February full council, Monday 12th February Transport Committee and Tuesday 20th February Estates Committee. The Council offers an open forum between 7.15 and 7.30, and 8-days' notice is required to the Clerk if you wish to speak to the Council at the open forum. If you wish to make a presentation or raise any issue with the council for a response at the following month's meeting, please contact the Clerk at least 8 days before the meeting.

Public period during the meeting - members of the public may make representations, answer questions and give evidence at a meeting which they are entitled to attend **in respect of the business on the agenda only.**

Please quote agenda item number where applicable. Time is limited to 2 minutes per person. In accordance with standing order 3(f), a question shall not require a response at the meeting nor start a debate on the question. The chair of the meeting may direct that a written or oral response be given.

NORTH TAWTON SCOUTS NEED YOR HELP - NEW LEADERS REQUIRED

Being the 1st North Tawton Group Scout Leader, I need to put an urgent request out for help to the local community. Since the early 1900's 1st North Tawton Scout Group has been a thriving part of the local community with our smart uniforms and blue/white kneckers being proudly worn by our young persons for all to see. During our history there have been some times when scouting in North Tawton stopped due to external issues, during the war and in more recent times due to COVID for example, but also several periods when Scouting stopped locally due to a shortage of adults volunteering to become leaders. Unfortunately we are now approaching the same scenario. We have been very lucky to have had a dedicated and stable leader team for many years, but for personal and work reasons several of the current leaders have reduced their availability to support the group. This means that although we will be issuing a full scout programme for the coming term, including camps for the year, there is a high probability that without new leaders we will need to cancel meetings at short notice or even close the scout section completely later in the term. This is the reality of the situation we are facing; the closure of the Scout section would result in the 24 Scouts we already have being unable to continue their Scouting Journey and will have knock on effects to the Cubs, Beavers and Squirrel Scouts who will be unable to move up through all the sections.

If you think you can help us, know of a family member or friend who would like to become a scout leader, then please talk to us urgently. Being a scout leader is great fun and doesn't need any particular skills to start. If you are interested in helping scouts to have fun and develop their personal and practical skills, then being a leader could be for you and is massively rewarding. The time commitment is not excessive; meetings taking up a couple of hours a week on a Wednesday evening with a small amount of preparation time depending on the activities and your current skill level. Please remember that we are only teaching the scouts the basics of most subjects, so you don't need to be experts in anything and it is easy for you to stay one step ahead of them with a bit of help from ourselves. In addition, in order to ensure we operate safely for both the scouts and yourselves, there is some training you must complete with the scout association. The mandatory training on safety and child protection consists of a few online courses that must be completed over the first few months and will take a few hours in manageable chunks. Further training is available and can be taken at a more leisurely pace as a mix of face to face and online training. Whilst scouting does not insist on having female leaders in the section as we have almost 50% of female scouts, we would very much like to be fully representative in the leader team, so this request is equally applicable to all parents, carers, family members and friends. News from the Moor

Hi everyone

I hope you are all well and have enjoyed the respite after the rain and high winds of December. As we begin a new year, I'd like to take this opportunity to share a highlight from the end of 2023.

On Saturday 25th November we hosted our annual St. Clement's Day event at Finch Foundry. St. Clement's Day sees Blacksmiths from all around the area, and some from further afield, come along to compete, meet and create in the historical environment of Finch Foundry. St. Clement's Day was traditionally a feast day set between Halloween and Christmas. As Clement was the patron saint of metalworkers and blacksmiths, the day was an opportunity for them to enjoy a day of feasting and traditions such as firing of the anvil, dressing up and parading as 'Old Clem' and asking for donations for an evening of celebration.

We start the St. Clement's celebrations with the firing of the anvil and then begin the competitions - two hours of forging to create a saleable item and the snail race where the fastest snail maker wins. At the 2023 celebration, after a day of creative competing, Adam Greenwell was awarded with the fastest snail prize, Greg Clarke's snail was deemed the best looking and Steve Wilson from the Cornish blacksmith collective was awarded with item of the day. We would like to thank Mike Jecks for firing the anvil, Bill Murray for the judging, all the brilliant blacksmiths, volunteers and helpers for making such a great event and all of our wonderful visitors for supporting it once again.

Looking ahead to 2024, we are busy getting ready to re-open various sites ready for the new season. Castle Drogo is opening earlier this year with the visitor centre, garden and castle fully open from Monday 5 February. The Ranger teams across the whole of the Moor are busy doing all of the winter tasks. This includes the management of ash trees which have Ash Dieback. Some of these trees are in very tricky locations, including some by the road to Castle Drogo so thank you to all our neighours for their support and patience during the road closure so we can undertake this work safely.

Easter is early this year at the end of March so here's hoping for lovely weather for the start of Spring. Best wishes everyone,



News From North Tawton Community Primary School

This month I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank our parent group 'Friends of North Tawton School.' Schools nationally, and in fact internationally, have parent and carer groups who work in ways to support the schools their children attend. Typically, they will organise a summer fair and run bake sales. Our North Tawton group do this, and a whole lot more!


We also have a mini scrapstore – come and take away some new craft materials and see what you can create! (The scrapstore will also be at the Repair Café for you to have a rummage).

INTERESTING BUILDINGS IN THE TOWN

In Market Street, just opposite Merry go Round, we find the Clink. (The name is still on the door.) This dates back to at least 1777 and maybe even earlier. It is a two-storey building – the Clink, or temporary prison, with two cells on the ground floor. The only means of air and light is provided by a small grill just 18" x 6" on the door leading to the street – this is still in existence. The upstairs room was the Magistrates' or Justices' Court until 1860 when it moved to the Market Hall (now the Town Hall). At about the same time, the "new" Police Station in North Street was built and the prisoners were then held in the new cells there. The Town Council met in the room upstairs. Next to the Clink door, there is another door and it was here that "Neptune" – the old horse-drawn fire engine – was housed.

A little further on, on the right hand side, is the Lych Gate entrance to the Church. Looking through the gate towards the church you will see an avenue of 12 lime trees representing the 12 apostles. There are 6 on either side of the path. The present ones are fairly recent, but there has been an avenue of lime trees here since about 1740. The originals were planted by Whig Clergy to show their sympathy with William of Orange and the Hanoverian succession – the Jacobites planted fir trees. A few yards further on, on the right, is Court Green, which was the ancient Manor House and belonged to the Valletort family. It was built in the 13th or 14th century and was in those days a moated site. Many of the properties in this area bear the letter 'P' on their walls. This means they once belonged to the Portsmouth family, who were Lords of the Manor 1718 – 1904.

Being an artist and husband being a climate scientist it was quite a good exhibition for us to go round together. It was interesting that husband's favourite piece was a bit debatable on the 'art front', though absolutely not on the 'science front'. It was a well-researched and well-communicated documentary on what coastal communities are doing about the climate crisis where they are. I too thought it was fantastic, and I gave it the most time of all the works in the show (partly due to its long format) but I wasn't really sure what it was doing in a gallery. It was certainly artis<u>tic</u>, and in some ways I believe anything is art if someone says it is (that doesn't necessarily mean it's 'good') but this piece was very 'educational'. Is the place of art to educate? I think its job is to 'bring to light', but should art 'tell' or 'make think'?

My favourite piece was much more open to interpretation. An army locker type arrangement with camo-clad mastic-guns stacked like rifles on a stainless-steel rack. In-between them, laid out on a table, was a detailed map of a small section of coast with a clear plan of action. After a bit of reading, it became apparent that the 'guns' were full of sea grass seed in a type of natural cement that people have been using to plant under water in appropriate coastal locations. Husband and I chuckled and said 'sticks most stones' which is in the small print of the miraculous CT1 which you can use underwater.

This new understanding of what it was I was looking at shone a new light onto the camouflage. Suddenly it was not wolf in sheep's clothing, but actually an attempt to blend in and be in harmony with nature. The army-type badge which at first glance appears like crossed guns, suddenly makes sense as two harmless and life-filled seeded-paste mastic-guns with sea grass flowing from the nozzles. In the context of our terrible wars, with people against people, this makes far more sense as a battle to unite us in caring for one another and the planet, bringing life instead of destruction.

Was it educational? It certainly took my thoughts on a journey, but did it excite me more to make my own connections through its strange poetry? Yes it did.

INTERESTING BUILDINGS IN THE TOWN (continued from Page 16)

Between Court Green and the Church there was a Green where wrestling took place. The championship hat and ribbons were hung in the Church on the Sunday previous to the matches. The Green also held the Village Pound for stray animals. The owners of the beasts had to pay before they were released to them. The Pound later moved to North Street, but is no longer in existence, there being no real necessity for one in this day and age.

Cross back to the left side of the road and we find Devonshire House – now the Doctors' Surgery and private dwellings. According to the date just below the Bell Tower, it would appear that it was built in 1862, but the first we know of it being in use is that from 1863 to 1895, it was known as "The Middle Class School" for boys, one of whom was the first Viscount Lambert. From 1895 until the 1930s it was the Devon Serge Warehouse and was owned by the Phillips family. They purchased the serge from the North Tawton Woollen Mill and made high-class clothing and clerical suits, which were sent to many parts of the world.

During World War II, the house was taken over by a stockbroking firm evacuated from London. Many locals remembered these evacuees with great affection as they entered into the activities of the town with great enthusiasm and were very helpful. Many friendships were made which continued for many years. In 1949 the house became the home of The North Devon Water Board and remained so until Dr. Warre made it the local surgery and clinic.

Lych gate to the Church of St Peter, Market Street, North Tawton - Awarded Listed Building Status List Entry Number: 1488362. Following your application to add the above building to the List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest, we have now considered all the representations made and completed our assessment of the building. I am delighted to inform you that having considered our recommendation, the Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport has decided to add Lych gate to the Church of St. Peter to the List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest. The building is now listed at Grade II.



Cllr. Christian Martin said "The nearest listed Lych Gate to North Tawton can be found in Monkokehampton - across Dartmoor and Devon there are only 58 that have been listed. The listing of North Tawton's Lych Gate brings the total to 59 which is a great feather in the town's cap. Now that the architectural merit has been recognised, I believe that the Lych Gate can forever now stand in the forefront of a bucolic scene set for romance, artistic creativity, inspiration, belief and spirituality behind which there lies the tree lined cobbled pathway completing the mis en scene. I couldn't be more delighted."
