

From The Rectory


Munching on some Mini Eggs (my favourite Easter chocolate snack), my mind was taken back a couple of years to Boxing Day. We'd run out of milk and so I went round the corner to our local Co-op. I wasn't sure if it would even be open – and much to the delight of our milk-less household it was. There weren't many customers and so the staff were re-stocking the shelves after the Christmas rush. And I was very surprised to see them filling the shelves with Easter eggs! This year it feels very early to be writing about Easter (mid-February) – it barely feels like I've recovered from Christmas. But Easter falls this year in March (just!). It is the festival in the Christian year where we celebrate new life. And by late-March as spring begins, we will see it all around us. The hedgerows and gardens will be full of spring flowers, taking over from the barren soils of winter. Animals will be more active. Farmers will be sowing, lambing, and calving. Spring is a season when we can all rejoice and be grateful for the gift of life and its continual renewal. But the renewal of the spring season in the natural world points us to the spiritual renewal of Easter. For Christians Easter is the celebration of the new life found in Jesus. On the first Easter Sunday, three days after he died, Jesus returned to life. His grave was empty; he was seen by over 500 people.

But this was much more than returning to life, it was human life as never seen before – a new quality, a new depth, and a life that was imperishable. We call it resurrection. And this resurrection life is something which Jesus offers us too. Those who follow Jesus have found a new quality of life now – lived in communion with God, free of shame and guilt, with God's peace, joy and love. And with a promise of new physical life after death too – just like Jesus'. The difference is meant to be as stark as the change from the frosty, frozen, bare winter hedgerows to the beautiful riot of colour, warmth and light of the hedgerow on a sunny spring day.

So, this Easter as you munch your Easter eggs or see another Easter bunny – why not rejoice in the new spring life they symbolise but also search out and find the new spiritual life that is found through Jesus.

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! (2 Corinthians 5:17)

Come along to a **Public Meeting on Thursday 18 April** in the Town Hall when you can find out more and become a member.



Annual Town Assembly Meeting

The Town council will hold their annual public assembly on Thursday 25th April 2024, 7pm in the Town Hall. Refreshments will be served by your Councillors commencing 6.30 p.m..

Town Crier

The Town Council will be holding a competition to select a new town crier. Further details to follow.

Town Flag

The Town council will be holding a competition to design a town flag. Further details to follow.

Christmas Trees for the Town Centre

The Town Council will be considering options and a joint enterprise with local businesses on how to provide trees/ decorations going forward which would satisfy the Councils insurers.

Clock Tower

Work to the masonry is underway and once completed we look forward to the canopy being reinstated. The bench seats have been taken away for routine maintenance.

Lych Gate

The listing for the Lych gate contained some inaccuracies which have been amended by Historical England. The work to the Lych Gate has now been completed in accordance with the detailed scheme of works approved by the Conservation Officer and Church Faculty and West Devon BC have confirmed they are wholly satisfied with the works despite receiving a complaint.

Public Meeting – Parking provision and electric vehicle charging

The meeting held on 26th January was well attended and the Council are looking at all options discussed and suggested by the public. The 'notes' of the meeting are available on the Town Council website, or a copy can be requested from the Town Clerk.

2024/25 Budget

The Council is happy to report it has agreed a budget of £165,811. This represents a decrease of £8,466 on 2023-24 which is a reduction 4.6% and a precept of £146,812, meaning the band D parish rate will be £203.23 which is a 0.01% DECREASE on 2023-24.

Warm Space and Community Fridge/Larder/Freezer

Thanks to grant funding from WDBC, the Town Council can continue to fund the warm space initiatives and Jens Café and Merry Go Round. The Community fridge has been expanded to include a freezer and food items donated by residents are now available from the community fridge. This initiative is to help residents who are struggling to keep warm and need a warm space and a cuppa, to get a cheap hot meal, or to help themselves to food items which have been donated.

Our next council meetings will be Tuesday 5th March full council. The Council offers an open forum between 7.15 and 7.30, and 8-days' notice is required to the Clerk if you wish to speak to the Council at the open forum. If you wish to make a presentation or raise any issue with the council for a response at the following month's meeting, please contact the Clerk at least 8 days before the meeting.

Public period during the meeting - members of the public may make representations, answer questions and give evidence at a meeting which they are entitled to attend **in respect of the business on the agenda only.** Please quote agenda item number where applicable. Time is limited to 2 minutes per person. In accordance with standing order 3(f), a question shall not require a response at the meeting nor start a debate on the question. The chair of the meeting may direct that a written or oral response be given.

Iconic Sculptures created in Devon

Following the BBC news feature yesterday covering the launch of the world's largest ship 'Icon of the Seas' on its maiden voyage from Miami, Devon sculptor Andrew Sinclair MRSS is delighted that his three magnificent diver sculptures were making waves in worldwide news, with their photographs streamed across CNN & Sky News, as well as the BBC.

The commission for the three divers was finally completed in August last year and was an epic project for Andrew and his team. Andrew was approached by International Corporate Art earlier in the year to create the three 7ft female sculptures, posed as if in a dive sequence. Not only did Andrew design and sculpt the magnificent, stylised figures, working with local metal fabricators and paint sprayers, he had to project manage the engineering and fixings of each piece for them to be installed on three different decks.



"I'm delighted to see that my diver sculptures have been featured in many news articles around the world – creating them was certainly a voyage of discovery! We used innovative techniques and new materials in their making and I'm extremely proud of the high-quality design and finish that my team and I ultimately achieved."

Created in Andrew's workshop in the heart of Devon, the figures made the journey to the shipyard in Turku, Finland, before the ship headed to Miami for its launch last week. Andrew has worked with ICA for over 30 years, producing a huge range of sculptures for cruise-liners, including giant venetian masks, to fire-breathing dragons, to astronauts and breakdancers. Andrew Sinclair is best known to the public for his famous David Bowie sculpture in Aylesbury and his Civic Award-winning sculpture in Halifax of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment.

As one of the world's leading realist figurative sculptors, Andrew Sinclair MRSS SWAc is considered an icon in the world of sculpture education too. Andrew is the co-director and lead tutor at The Sculpture School in Devon,

News From North Tawton Community Primary School

Highlights of the first half term of 2024

As always, it's never a dull moment at our lively primary school! Here are some of our highlights from the past six weeks.

Year Six have been learning about American Civil Rights, and Martin Luther King Jr.'s famous 'I Have a Dream' speech and what this means to us here and now. They have written their own versions of Brothers Grimm fairy tales and in RE are discussing how stories are used to promote good behaviours in religious teaching and our shared cultures.

Year Five have been learning about magnetism, culminating in making their own electromagnets! They have learnt about medieval monarchs and in English read a fascinating book about Phillippe Petit, the high-wire trapeze artist (don't try this at home!) and writing his biography from their research.

Our Year Four class have learnt about the planets in our solar system using their mnemonic 'My Very Excellent Mum Just Served Us Noodles' as a way of remembering the planets in order from the sun! They have also learnt about the Anglo Saxons and are competitively committing all times tables to memory.

The sound of glockenspiels and recorders have been heard from our Year Three classroom this term. They have also been learning about Islam prayer and fasting and the history of the Shang Dynasty in Ancient China. We have welcomed three new children to the class who have all settled in brilliantly.

Year Two have written and made their own fantastic Animal Orchestra pop-up book based on The Bear and the Piano. They have also enjoyed learning about scientists and engineers, and in music they have been playing rhythms on Djembe drums.

Year One have been reading the book Begu which has helped them think about our similarities and differences and how to be kind and welcoming. In Design and Technology they have been learning how to fix moving parts to a structure, they all made a windmill and enjoyed singing the song 'The Windmill in old Amsterdam' as they cut, glued and attached sails to their mills.

Reception class have been exploring the whole world! From the deserts to the polar caps, the rainforest to under the sea! They have been learning French games and stories from a native speaker (thank you Marion!) They also went by coach to visit the aquarium at Plymouth!

As always, our adventurous nursery children have been bursting with energy and excitement for learning! They have been on rockets to the moon, in time capsules back to Ancient Egypt and across the seas to China to celebrate New Year.

Across the school we have been making our maths lessons more practical and have introduced a model of 'I do, we do, you do' which is supporting our children to become more confident to work independently. We have all been enjoying the wet and muddy great outdoors, particularly working with Sarah Augbaya from the Devon Wildlife Trust. Coach Pearson has been leading sports, and we have joined local schools for Ability Games and Cross Country. As always, we enjoy coming together each day to share achievements, sing and learn more about being great citizens. Regular learning walks by leaders, and two visits from Dan Morrow our CEO have all confirmed we are striving to do our best to ensure our children are being supported to be the best they can be.





At first glance, some might think North Tawton a sleepy little place with not a great deal going on, but tucked away in isolated spots are pockets bursting with creativity.

The silversmith, tap, tap, taps away hammering metal, transforming it into earrings, bangles, rings and necklaces.

Sculptors, with blocks of stone or wood, wield chisels – chipping away with precision, or they twist and bend metal to formulate their vision.

The potter throws lumps of wet clay onto the wheel and with sleight of hand gently moulds it into bowls, cups and vases.

Textile artists create inspiring patterns while the painter, brush in hand, boldly applies colour to excite, to disturb, to please, to intrigue.

Writers juxtapose sentences on pages to create meaning, while poets dance, twist and somersault with words to create scenes.

Actors find quiet corners to rehearse their lines while guitarists strum away in bedrooms and singers practise songs to provide a musical melody in choirs and bands.

Photographers capture that precious moment for posterity while video editors splice and cut their film into meaningful stories.

All this creativity mostly takes place behind closed doors – in townhouses and garden studios in and around the area.

Artists, performers, and craftspeople perfecting their trade in isolation – some earning a living by it, some semi-professional, and some for the sheer joy of it.

There are many opportunities this year to see this creativity showcased: in addition to individual events staged by artists and performers, the NT Events Group is planning an exhibition at the Community Centre 26th-28th April; on 12th July we look forward to a music festival brought to us by the new local organisation Tawlands; Ruth Smith Gallery looks forward to hosting two photography exhibitions, by Tim Bradshaw and Arran Hawkins; and Red Mud Arts has a whole host of different events and groups to get involved with including open mic nights, life drawing, artist meet-ups and critique groups.

So here's to a creative, prosperous and fruitful springtime where, with the help of these catalysts for creativity, people can exchange ideas, gain feedback and become even more inspired to hone their craft.

SAMPFORD COURTENAY PRAYER BOOK REBELLION



In June 1549 Sampford Courtenay was the location of a local uprising against the forced installation of the Book of Common Prayer. This soon gained support and resulted in a 'Rebel Force' laying seige to Exeter City.

After being overwhelmed by Royalist forces in a number of battles the Rebels were finally driven back to Sampford Courtenay in August, where they made a last stand and sustained major casualties.

In 1999 to mark the 450th Anniversary of the Rebellion, an illustrated display was established in the Church and the Village held a number of commemmorative events including a Tudor Fair.

This year will be the 475th Anniversary and plans are being developed to mark both the start of the Rebellion and the final Battle.

The first Sampford Courtenay Parish meeting this year was held on January 17th and the minutes are available on the website . At each meeting, councillors report on the parish priority areas under their responsibility and a summary of these key issues affecting the community and updates on actions is outlined below.

Parish Priorities

Safer Roads – Cllr. Collins has made another funding application to West Devon Borough Council to provide additional salt bins in the parish and at the March meeting, he will be updating us on that application progress.

The Autumn Clean Up – Cllr. McIlwraith reported that he approached Network Rail for a new licence which will enable access to the Sampford Courtenay Station property – this is pending and a future report will be brought back to a parish council meeting.

Prayer Book Rebellion – Marion Pratt attended the Prayer Book Rebellion meeting and reported that it had been productive . Her notes of the meeting are recorded on the Parish website.

Dog Fouling – Cllr. Wilson had contacted the WDBC Dog Warden and raised the parish concerns. WDBC have agreed to undertake patrols with a remit to identify offending dog owners and potentially take enforcement action. In the next few months there will be notices on bins – household leaflets drops and media information.

Snow Plan and Grit Bins – Cllr. Wilson had provided the Church with a salt bag and discussed areas of concern over the use of Grit Bins – one answer could be localised training.

Village Green Inspection – Cllr. Wilson undertook the monthly village green inspection and provided a report.

Highlight on Footpaths

The lead for the maintenance of our rights of way that run through the parish is Cllr. Mike Carpenter. This involves walking the footpath and rights of way at least once a year and submitting a maintenance report to Devon County Council who are responsible for financing their maintenance. Each year we submit a bid for works to be done and if successful, they are allocated to us by DCC. In the last financial year, we have undertaken work along Cliston Lane and have funds to cover initial works to the Water Path and Footpath through the Village Green. Our aim here is to improve not only the surface but accessibility which will also benefit the church. An initial site level survey has been completed. Over the last few years we have undertaken work to Cliston Lane, Weirford Lane, Bulland Lane and Sholgate Lane as well as improve accessibility to various footpaths with new styles and gates. We also successfully bid for a battery powered Strimmer which was funded by the DCC.If anyone is aware of any issues with our various rights of way please contact Cllr. Mike Carpenter 07973 271923.


