**N.B. All cakes etc. must be exhibited on a plate and covered in cling film when exhibited.**

79. Four scones (any flavour) (fluted edge = sweet; plain – savoury)
80. Fruit cake - set recipe: 12oz fruit, 4oz sugar, 4oz marg/butter, 1/4pt water, 1 egg and 8ozs self-raising flour.  
Method: place fruit, sugar, marg and water in pan, simmer slowly for 20mins, allow to cool, add beaten egg and stir in flour. Turn into greased 6/7" tin and bake for about 1 1/2hrs at 350F, 180C or Gas mark 4.

## Hints for exhibitors

The following hints are designed to help give a few pointers to all entrants but particularly the beginners amongst you.



1. Please read all the rules carefully.
2. Remember the correct times for staging your exhibits.
3. Always check the number of exhibits required in a Class, eg. Peas (6 pods) – An incorrect number will be disqualified and the exhibitor card marked NAS (Not as Schedule). This is a common mistake and leads to disappointment for the exhibitor.
4. Always pay attention to the appearance of your exhibits. They should be clean, fresh and free from blemishes and pests. Try to display as attractively as possible. Visit other shows to see how they are presented. It is a good way to prepare and understand how your exhibit can look at its best.
5. If you do clean and prepare your exhibit, do so as gently as possible. Highly polished exhibits will be seen as “unnatural”. Exhibits with skins rubbed off will be marked down.
6. All fruits should have stalks left on and the vegetables should be trimmed and dressed as follows:
  - Onions should be dressed by tying or whipping with cotton or raffia; rings may be used.
  - Root vegetables should have at least 75mm (3ins) of tops left on.
  - Tomatoes should have stalks left on.

*These tips are to set apart home grown produce from shop bought.*
7. Always try to display exhibits that are similar in size and shape. They will look better and receive a more favourable decision from the judges.
8. Entering the show is meant to be **enjoyable**, and, unless you win a prize, all entries are anonymous – so you won't be embarrassed in front of your friends and neighbours.

Judges use **RHS “The Horticultural Show Handbook”** obtainable from RHS website or bookshops, for more tips and information.

## **RULES AND TIPS FOR FIRST TIME EXHIBITORS**

- Unless you are entering a class marked **OPEN** all Exhibitors should reside in the parishes of Sampford Courtenay and Honeychurch.
- All exhibits must be grown or made by you and craft work should not have been previously exhibited at Sampford Courtenay Show.
- **All entry forms to be in by 7-00pm on Wed 2<sup>nd</sup> Sept 2026**
- **NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED**
- **ADULTS (OVER16)** in the current economic climate and to encourage more entries and exhibits there is **NO CHARGE**
- **CHILDREN UNDER THE AGE OF 16 – NO CHARGE FOR ENTRIES THIS YEAR.**
- Children may enter all adult classes or older children's classes.
- Children must put their **age** (not name) on their exhibits. Consolation prizes will be given to all exhibitors under 16 years who do not win a prize.
- All exhibits must be brought to the village hall either on Friday **4<sup>th</sup> Sept between 6pm – 7pm or on the day of the show 5<sup>th</sup> Sept 2026 between 8-45 and 10-00am.**
- All vegetables must be washed and trimmed
- **The village hall will be cleared at 10-00 am for judging to commence**
- The committee will take reasonable care of exhibits but will not be held responsible for any loss or damage.
- Exhibitors wishing to remove their exhibits must do so between 2-45pm and 3-00pm. Exhibits remaining will be auctioned off.
- **N.B. Prizes will be presented immediately following the auction**
